THE TALLEST OFFICE SIR WILFRID LAURIER BUILDING IN THE WORLD

Now Being Erected in New York--It Will Be 25 Stories High--Charles Morse Leads the Enter-

ago Mr. Morse and his associates got control of the National Bank of North America, which then had a capital of \$1,000,000 absorbed and merged it into the bank of the State of New York, which had a capital of \$1,200,000 and a surplus of \$56,000, and moved the enlarged bank to the home of the latter concern at the northwest corner of William street and Exwest corner of William street and Ex-change place. From basement to roof, exclusive of the pent house, the building will be 327 feet high, which means about 327 feet from the street level to the roof. This excell even the Park row building, today the tallest office structure in the world, for while the towers of the latter rise 382 feet above ground, the height of he roof itself is only 309 feet. The height of the St. Paul Building, at No. 220 Broadway, is 308 feet.
The Bank of North America's new structure will contain about 7,524 square feet of rentable space to a floor. Includ-

feet of rentable space to a floor. Including the basement there will be about five acres of rentable space in this structure, and yet it stands on only four lots of ground.

They will be the most productive four lots, from the standpoint of revenue, in the world. At an average rental of two delicers of course foot ner apparent to the rear

the world. At an average rental of two dollars a square foot per annum, the yearly income from the new building will be nearly \$400,000. The structure rests on caissons, which have been sink to bed rock. It will be fireproof throughout, with marble lined corridors. The George A. Fuller Company, the contractors, are to have it ready on the first of next May.
