

BOURASSA AIBS HIS ANTI-BRITISH VIEWS

Montreal, March 6 .- (Special) -- Henr

Bourassa in Le Nationaliste, a new sheet first published today in the interests of the National League, has a signed article on the proposal to send English troops to Canada, as a preparatory measure to their transportation to the Far East.

Mr. Bourassa declares it was not for Canada that England made a treaty with Japan. It was to check Russia's formidable expansion in the Far East. It was to safe guard the open door in China where cotton from Lancashire looms and opium from India finds a good market. It was therefore in her own interest that was therefore in her own interest that England was thinking of sending troops to Canada. Stationed at Vancouver they to Canada. Standard at Vancouver they would be within fitteen days sail of the seat of war, while the other powers would have the long and slow voyage through the Suez Canal to perform before landing


