fession of faith are from the Bible Class and Sunday School, a gratifying indication of the faithfulness in sowing by those to whom is entrusted the great work of

feeding the Lambs.

The attendance at the weekly prayer meeting has been well sustained, as also the interest in the subjects discussed. Can we all not add our presence on such occasions? The Lords' day morning and evening services have been larger than at any time in the past, and with God's blessing on the preached word, must in the near future, yield a large spiritual harvest. The Sacrament of the Supper was observed 3 times during the year, with the following large attendance of members, 230, 248, 243. The number of Baptisms for the year was 9.

The pastor's visiting book shows a record of 283 pastoral calls and visits, of which 76 were to sick and

afflicted.

As the various organizations present their own reports, it is unnecessary for the members of Session to dwell on the good work accomplished but they would thankfully acknowledge the zeal and earnestness displayed by all the workers of both sexes. In addition to the organizations of this Congregation for Christian work mentioned in last year's report, the members of Session mention, with much gratification, The Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor recently formed, and which gives promise of great usefulness.

During the year we have had many sad bereavements which we trust have drawn us all nearer to the Lord, and deepened in us all a sense of responsibility for the improvement of our remaining times in the world. The Lord has taken from us the little child, the youthful entefing on womanhood, the strong man in the midst of his days, and the aged who have long borne the burden and heat of the day. Let us all so live that we will be able to say in beginning the unknown future of 1891, "whether living or dying we are the Lords."
