A DELICATE QUESTION.

Relations of Catholies Inside and Out-

The next Catholic Congress will devote itself entirely to social topics,— social topics which in various forms have shaken the world since the time of Moses; but there is one social topic that is too delicate to be handled; and that is the social relations of Catholics of a Congregation, —I presume we may say "parish" now—with one another.

We know that the main strength of

non-Catholic religious organizations lies in the strengthening of the social relations. side of their ' Every minister understands that thor oughly. He does not imagine that his eloquence will hold his flock together, nor the beautiful prayers he addresses to them, nor his choir, nor his service of song, nor his Thursday evening meeting. He does not depend on dogma; for to his congregation dogma is

ceeds in proportion to the skill with which he does this. Mr. Lyman Abbott, for instance—Mr. Beecher's successor in Plymouth church-has suc ceeded in a most difficult position, cause he knows the management of the social wires.

social clubs. And so far as careful and complete organization is concerned, nothing can exceed the perfection of organization within Jesuit congregations. We have all observed the care with which the Fathers of the society-God bless them !-will create a parish out of nothing and make it ourish through all difficulties. A priest has no time for the little social attentions which occupy so many of the hours of the minister and the minister's Besides, he can not dine with one member of his congregation, except on special occasions, without exciting the criticisms of the rest of his people. There is an impression in Catholic congregations that the poor man's corned beef and cabbage is just as good as the rich man's pate de foie gras. And the priest must accept this unless he is willing to cause much heart-burning and dissatisfaction. The consequence is, that from motives of prudence, priest with every grace of mind and charm of manner, must stay at home a great deal. For in this country. there is nothing that the body of Cath olics resent so much as any seeming partiality on the part of their pastor for the rich. A priest with us has no social position; he is everybody's equal

and everybody's superior.

The priest, then, is powerless to rattle the social dry bones into life as the ministers do. Whatever can be done must be done by the people them-Whatever can be selves. Do they do enough of it? Would it add to the strength and the influence of the Faith in this country, if more of it were done? And how can it be done?

There is a constant complaint that the Catholics are unsocial among themselves. There is a constant complaint that good young men and young women drift away from us because they are frozen out of their proper environment. There is a constant complaint that while there is the greatest equality in our churches, we are devoted more to the worship of caste outside of them than any other class of people. "God and myself," the sarcastic say, is our motto,—and that our neighbors are only helped by us when they are entirely trodden down by the world; that we have no room for equals, and that we are merely tolerant to inferiors. THE "SALVE REGINA."

One of the sweetest and most beautiful hymns or antiphons with which the Catholic Church salutes the everblessed Mother of God is undoubtedly the "Salve Regina," or "Hail Holy Queen." It rises daily from the lips of many thousands of priests and religious at the end of Compline and the faithful are wont to include it in their evening prayers. It is a suppliant prayer, a cry for help, and who can read it attentively without being deeply impressed by its meaning? Surely it must be most acceptable to

the tender heart of Mary.

This favorite prayer was composed by a Benedictine monk called Hermanus Contractus, or Herman the Lame. Herman was the son of Count Wolfrath II. and Hiltrude, and was born in the year 1013. Of fourteen children he was apparently the most unfortunate, for, when about six years old, he caught a severe cold, in consequence of which his limbs were so contracted that he obtained the surname of "Contractus," or the Lame. In the hour of trial he had recourse to the Comfortress of the afflicted, and sought her assistance. Nor did he seek in vain. Restored to health, he was many friends, and his great learning

At the age of thirty he took his solemn vows. According to Trithemius, he was thoroughly skilled in philosophy, astronomy, poetry, rhetoric and music, and was conversant with the Latin, Greek, Arabic and Hebrew languages. The most important of his writings, at least, as far as they have come down to us, is his "Chronicle." It extends is of great documentary value to the

The concluding words of the Salve Regina: "O clement, O loving, O most sweet Virgin Mary," were added, as is well known, by St. Bernard about the year 1146. St. Bernard was commissioned by Pope Eugene III. to preach a crusade, or military expediion, for the recovery of the Holy Land. The saint readily complied with the

wish of the Pope, and preached with truly apostolic zeal at Constance, Basle, Treiburg, Cologne and other cities On Christmas Eve he came to Spires and was accompanied to the cathedral by the Bishop and people in solemn procession. Conrad III. and the princes of the empire who were assembled at the Reichstag, or Imperial Diet, at Spires received the saint with every mark of distinction. On entering the Dom, Salve Regina was intoned with

was deeply moved, and as the last words resounded: "After this our exile show unto us the blessed fruit of thy womb, Jesus," the saint exclaimed: "O clemens, O pia, O dulcis Virgo Maria"—"O clement, O loving, O sweet Virgin Mary."






