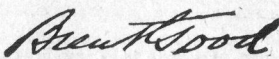

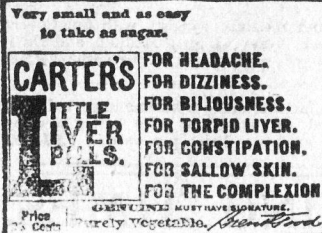

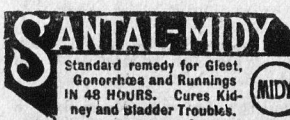

Interesting Facts Concerning the Manufactories That Have Made Chatham Thrive  
McKeough & Trotter.

This industry, which is now under the control of the firm of McKeough & Trotter, was first established in Chatham in the year 1873. Robert Parkinson, who is now living in the Western States, was the founder. Frank McKeough entered the business twenty years ago and Mr. Trotter followed him shortly after. Ever since then the firm has been known as McKeough & Trotter.

The business was first started in a small way but it has been gradually increased and expended from year to year until now this firm handles and manufactures everything in the machine line, including such articles as the Ward patent barrel, hoop and stove machinery, barrel trusses, saw mills, portable and stationary, marine and stationary engines, and boilers, gasoline engines, and launches, oil well drilling outfits, iron pumps, iron kettles, and steel pans, etc. Their works consist of boiler shops, smelt-

ing shops, machine shops and foundry. Besides all this they are western agents for the Reeve Pulley Manufacturing Co., Toronto, and the Saddle & Howarth Leather Belting Co. They are also dealers in iron, pipe, brass and steam fittings and oil well supplies.

In all of these lines of business the firm is very busily employed. Business is growing rapidly from year to year. Last year's trade was the best experienced in the history of the company, and this year's prospects are even brighter.

The drilling rig used on the Edwards farm by the Chatham Oil Co. was manufactured by this firm, and they have just received an order for another rig, which will be used in the Raleigh oil fields.

Twenty-five to thirty men are employed by this firm, and the money paid out in wages each year amounts to about \$10,000, so that the firm is of great value to the city as a labor employing concern.
