## 2tates．

The leview will publish in an carly number the spech delivered a few days ago at Cork by Sir John Pope Hemnessy，one of the most distinguished Irishmen of the day，upon the life and work of Father Mathew， during the recent ceremonies in his honow in that city．

Mr．Davirt is making things lively in the Labour World．He has had very little difficulty in showing up Mr．James McDermott as an utter scoundrel；and at present someone is engaged in contributingto his joumal a series of papers entitled＂Enghish Catholic Entrigue Against Ireland in Rome，By a Member of the Society of＂Jesus．＂＇lhe papers in question are so dull，so stupid， and badly written as to make it evident that Mr．Davitt has been the rictim of a hoak．＂We have mot the slightest hesitation，＂says the Irish（＇utholic：oi ；blin， ＂in expressing our belief that no Jesuit Fath ever wrote a line of the articles in question which $f$ s ：the evident design of their writer to misrepresent the rob－ able causes of Papal action must be objectional e to every Catholic．＂

Mr．Tanouchene is a little hard on Archdeacon S．arar． Discussing in a late number of T＇ruth the Archede．on＇s scheme for＂Brotherhood＂in the Anglican Chureh， that pungent writer says：
＂It is indeed a very remarkable thing that Archdeacon Farrar，of all men，should have made this subject his own．The chosen adrocate of the three rules of（1） poverty，（2）celibacy，（3）olodience，is（1）a portly，well－ to－do ecclesiastic，well in the ruming for a bishopric，a palace and $£ 5,000$ a year ；（2）a married man；（3）a preacher whose disregard of the authority of the Church has been manifested by more than one lapse into hetero－ doxy．If it really requires nothing less than a new order of mendicant friars to bring the Church to the masses，or the masses to the Church－and for anything I know it may－with what judgment shall Archdeacon Farrar and some of his colleagues on the phatform at Hull be judged？＂

Oun contemporary，the Mirror，of Baltimore，indulges in $\Omega$ bit of sarcasm at the expense of the encrgetic news－ paper men on the other side of the Atlantic who send
out the ：eracious Vatica：despatehes．It says ：－＂The cable correspondents are busily engaged in the labour． of creating new cardinals．The latest batch turned out by these enterprising and accomplished persons includes the names of Arehbishops Stonor，Walsh，and Fiemick． It is needless to say that these prelates will not be for－ mally invested with the dignity of the cardinalate mantil Pope Leo XIII，has had time io ratify the selection． The engemess of a certain class of journalists to relieve the grovermment of the Church of the onerons duties of making appointments and conferring honours，speaks volumes for the solicitude felt by its members for the personal comfort of the Holy Father；but there is reason to fear that the benevolent purpose of the cor－ respondents is not esteened as highly as it might be at the Vatican．＂

T＇me proposal of Mgr．Howley，Vicar－Apostolic of Newfoundland，that the Pope should act as arbitrator in the Newfoundland Fisherios dispute between France and England，is exciting no little discussion in the French papers，Catholic and Radical．The real question，how－ ever，is，Will the French Govermment aceept the arbi－ tration of the Pope？Upon that point there is great doubt．It must be remembered that the majority of the liepublican party is composed of men who are fanatieal in their hatred of the Papacy．With them，for the most part，it is not a question of policy，but of religion． Among these Frectininkers，infidels，and avowed atheists， are men who camot even hear the name of the lope withont breaking out into abuse，not only of the Papacy， but of revealed religion iteelf．The present（rovern－ ment，if not absolutely in their hands，is cither out of policy or inclination guided by their counsels，as shown， on almost every occasion，by its warfare against the Church and its ministers．

Mr．G．A．Sala，the well－known English joumalist， has had，as is his wont，a mild reminiscence appropriate to the celebrations lately held in honomr of Father Mathew．He says：
＂I remember when Father Mathew first came to London and convened a monster＇lemperance meeting on Hampstead Heath，whither tens of thousands rushed to take the pledge．Among the sigmatories were，if I remember aright，the vencrable Earl Stanhope，grand－ father of the present peer．＇Temperance medals were more frequently seen at the button－holes then than the blue ribbon is now；but what a lamentable thung it is that the results of crusades，of whatever nature they be，albeit trimplant for awhile，are rarely permanent． Peter the Hermit lashed half Europe into a frenoy of militant piety，and crusade after crusade to the Holy Land astonished the infidels：yet the Crescent still Hoats over Jerusalem，and Turkish soldiers mount guard at Easter in the Chmeh of the Hol．Scpulchre，to keep the peace between contending Catholics，Grecks，and Armenians．Possibly the eloquence of Father Mathew induced sixty thousand people in London to take the pledge ；but how many millions of pounds sterling did the Revemue gather last year from the drink traffic？＂

Upon this the Weelly Register very properly remarks that what it is straighter to the point to ask is，how many more millions still would the Revenue gather but for Father Mathew and those on whom lis mantle has fallen？
