 PAST YEAR.

Messrs. Dun, Wiman & Co., of the Mercantile Agency, in issuing their record of failures in the Dominion of Canada during the past year give the number of failures amongst the traders of Canada for the past five years with their liabilities, as follows:—

For a third consecutive year the liabilities of

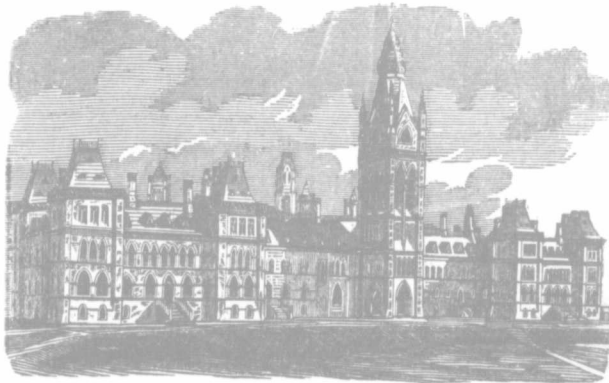
our insolvents exceed twenty-five millions of dollars.
