**J. R. BRADLEY REFUSES TO
 EXPLAIN DISCREPANCIES**

Says Statements are Getting Too Much Mixed Up—
 Peary Still at Battle Harbor—Sad News of Death of
 Members of His Party

POINT AMOOR, Labrador, Sept. 9.—
 The steamer Roadstead with Com-
 mander Peary on board, is supposed to be
 still at Battle Harbor, Labrador. The
 weather here is fine.

ROME, Sept. 9.—Commander Cagni,
 who was with the Duke of the Abruzzi
 in his Polar expedition, said yesterday
 with reference to the respective claims
 of Cook and Peary: "That Peary would
 reach the Pole one day I never doubted,
 or have I doubted the sincerity of the
 affirmations of 'Dr. Cook, but of
 Peary's I am more than convinced."

The doubts with regard to 'Dr.
 Cook' continued, "are from the in-
 consistency of his first statements, the
 misunderstandings regarding the Polar
 temperature, the position of the newly
 discovered land and his apparent lack
 of preparation for the expedition. In
 judging the two explorers the fact that
 geographical and astronomical observa-
 tions made by the two expeditions are
 in position of which alters daily, in-
 creases the difficulty. The observa-
 tions made, however, and the both

 gence is impossible but final judgment
 must be handed down until we have
 exhaustively compared their diaries
 and reports of the results obtained by
 the two travellers."

NEW YORK, Sept. 9.—John R. Brad-
 ley, who financed the Cook expedition
 party, declined yesterday to give any
 statement that would reconcile the con-
 flicting statements made by him and
 Dr. Cook in his lecture Tuesday
 night in Copenhagen as to the objects
 of the Cook expedition, saying that
 matters were becoming so mixed up
 that he would have nothing more to
 say in the controversy that had arisen.
 Mr. Bradley said in this city on Sun-
 day that the plans of the start were
 carefully laid, then exhibited checks
 paid out for supplies to show as he
 said, "we were doing something more
 than fitting out for a fishing trip."
 Mr. Bradley further said that no one
 who financed the Cook expedition
 until it reached Etah, Green-
 land.

**EVERYONE HAD EXPRESSED OPINIONS
 REGARDING THE McDOUGALL CASE**

Only Eleven Jurors Secured Out of Two Panels, One
 of Fifteen and the Other of Thirty—Additional
 Panel Summoned This Afternoon—McDougall
 Pleaded "Not Guilty"—No Plea of Justification

The case against C. Bruce McDougall
 was commenced this morning in the
 Circuit Court before His Honor Mr.
 Justice White. Attorney General
 Hazen and J. B. M. Baxter, K. C., ap-
 peared for the crown and J. Ritchie,
 K. C., A. J. Mellish and J. C. Sherren
 for the defence.

When the court adjourned at noon
 full jury was not obtained. Eleven
 out of the twelve, the requisite num-
 ber, were sworn and the last one will
 be obtained this afternoon, as His
 honor instructed the sheriff to summon
 an additional panel.

Mr. Ritchie for the accused, pre-
 sented an able argument to support
 his motion to quash the indictment.
 His honor, however, disallowed the mo-
 tion and the prisoner was called upon to
 plead. Some surprise was caused by
 the fact that a plea of "not guilty"
 was the only one made, as it was ex-
 pected that a plea of justification
 would be made. However, the time
 for such a plea is past.

Mr. Ritchie in supporting his motion
 claimed that no case, legal justifica-
 tion, or defence was shown. His argu-
 ment contained the elements necessary
 to constitute an offence of criminal
 defamation. After quoting the defini-
 tion of "defamation" and "libel" con-
 tained in the code, the learned counsel
 submitted that the indictment did not
 negative that the alleged libel was
 published with legal justification. He
 cited the case of the Queen vs.
 Cameron, (2 C. C. 118), a Montreal
 case in support of his contention. He
 showed thereby that the libel was con-
 tained in the papers, and that the
 defendant was not a criminal.

After a few minutes consultation the
 jury returned. Mr. Bailey stood
 up and said that he had no objection
 to the jury being sworn. His honor
 ordered the additional panel to be
 called.

William G. Scovill announced that he
 did not stand indifferent. He had been
 attacked in Free Speech. His honor
 stood him aside for the present.

Mr. Ritchie challenged Louis King,
 one of the most largely attended
 jurymen of the decade. Mr. Ritchie
 said he had no objection to Mr. King
 being sworn. Mr. Maxwell was ex-
 cused.

**WAR IS SURELY COMING
 SAYS LORD NORTHCLIFF**

Owner of London Times Tells Canadians of
 Germany's Great Preparation

WINNIPEG, Man., Sept. 9.—Lord
 Northcliff of the London Times, in an
 interview here Tuesday, predicted war
 between Germany and Great Britain.
 He said that in the Krupp gun works
 alone 100,000 men are working night
 and day and on Sunday preparing for
 war. He said:
 "I would make the suggestion, with
 all respect to the Canadians, who are
 investing their money and labor in
 constructing railroads and building
 grain elevators, that they keep an eye
 on European affairs and begin to fig-
 ure out why it is that all the ship-build-
 ing yards in Germany are busy con-
 structing rapid cruisers and first-class
 battleships, and why it is Krupp's
 works have increased their hands to
 over 100,000 men, nearly the popula-
 tion of Winnipeg."
 Lord Northcliff stated that some
 Canadians have utopian views and that
 war is a crime.
 "They do not throw money away.
 They made an immense sum of money
 out of their last great war."
 He said that Germany is preparing
 when they think it will pay. Many
 people say now they will fight Great
 Britain in the near future and some
 have mentioned the year 1912.
