# FOR BETTER MAIL SERVICE

Trustees of Board of Trade Will Make Supreme Effort.

Fire Protection Is the Uppermost Theme - Sanitation Committee Appointed.

A regular meeting of the trustees of the Board of Trade was held in Preident L. R. Fulda's office, those present being Messrs, McMullen, Yemans, Tozier, Fulda and Secretary Clayton. Postmaster Hartman was present by request and gave some interesting information relative to the mail service. He said that the contract with the carriers between Skagway and Dawson calls for Rates will be reduced in proportion to the transportation of 700 pounds of the distance carried as compared with mail matter each trip; that previous to those charged formerly. It is proposed consists of two loads and is probably up to the required weight. When asked why papers, magazines, etc., from the United States and upon which first-class postage is paid does not come, Mr. Hartman was not able to state, but pre sumed the described mail is held in the offices in which mailed, there being an order to that effect from the U. S. postal serivce. The postmaster advised that the U. S. officials be corresonded with and asked to act at once in alleviating present conditions. Mr. Hartman is not aware that any mail matter which arrives at Skagway is held at that place. The special committee on mails, Messrs, Fulda, Yemans Nourse and Secretary Clayton was instructed to forward the letter on the lines proposed by Mr. Hartman.

The committee on fire, light and water, E. C. Allen chairman, reported having conferred with the chief, of the fire department and found that no ordinance respecting flues is in existence in the district. It was maintained by the trustees that there is in existence an ordinance regulating the running of stove pipe through partitions and regu lating the distance at which stoves

shall be placed from walls.

A communication from Governor Ogilvie informed the body that an ordinance providing for the compulsory construction of brick chimneys and flues within a certain district will certainly be passed by the council at an early date. Mr. Hartman offered the suggestion that in 'the erection of brick chimneys they be plastered on the inside with mortar in which a large amount of salt is mixed, thus giving to the chimney a glazed surface on which neither scot nor creosote will accumulate The suggestion being a new one, Mr Hartman was cordially thanked for offering it.

A letter from Geo. W. Van Meter, who is on 33 below upper, Dominion, asked for the co-operation of the board of trade in securing for him a franchise for the construction of a water system in this city, he having been granted a franchise in February of 1898, the franchise having been later changed, Van Meter charges, and rendered useless by the intervention of Governor Ogilvie. The communication was referred to the committee on fire, light and water.

President McMullen of the Board of Trade notified the trustees of his appointment as a standing committee on health and sanitation Messrs. Joseph L. Lancaster, Chas. J. K. Nourse and Richard Guiles. The appointments were confirmed by the trustees.

The matter of having garbage dumped further down the river than has formerly been the custom of the scavengers was discussed at length but no definite action was taken. The matter of arrang ing for the disposition of garbage after the river opens was also freely dis

The board instructed the secretary to call the attention of the council to the matter of requiring all places of amuse ment to construct their doors to open but, and to have all balconies and galleries properly supported; also to the matter of fire escapes for that class of buildings.

## Bodies Not Yet Found.

Major Perry stated today that as yet the bodies of the three men who are supposed to have been murdered on the trail Christmas day, Clayson, Relfe and Olsen, have not yet been found, nor has any addition! light been thrown on the mystery that reveals anything tangible. The Major says, however, that to a very great degree the mystery is being cleared to the police in charge of the search and the investigation, but nothing as yet can be given out as absolute. Just what Major Perry means by "matters are clearing up" is not definite, but it is very certain that he knows what he is asserting, and as the two men, Graves and O'Brien, arrested on very strong suspicion of being the guilty parties, are held in close confine ment at Tagish, he may mean that a confession is forthcoming from one of the prisoners that will unmask the mystery. At any rate, there is little doubt but that Major Perry will in the near future be in position to impart some very interesting information regarding what now has the appearance of being the most daring and atrocious crime in the history of the broad white

As the wire is down today at some point between Tagish and Bennett, no news was receved of the actions of Clayson's friends at the other end of the line.

## Weather Report.
