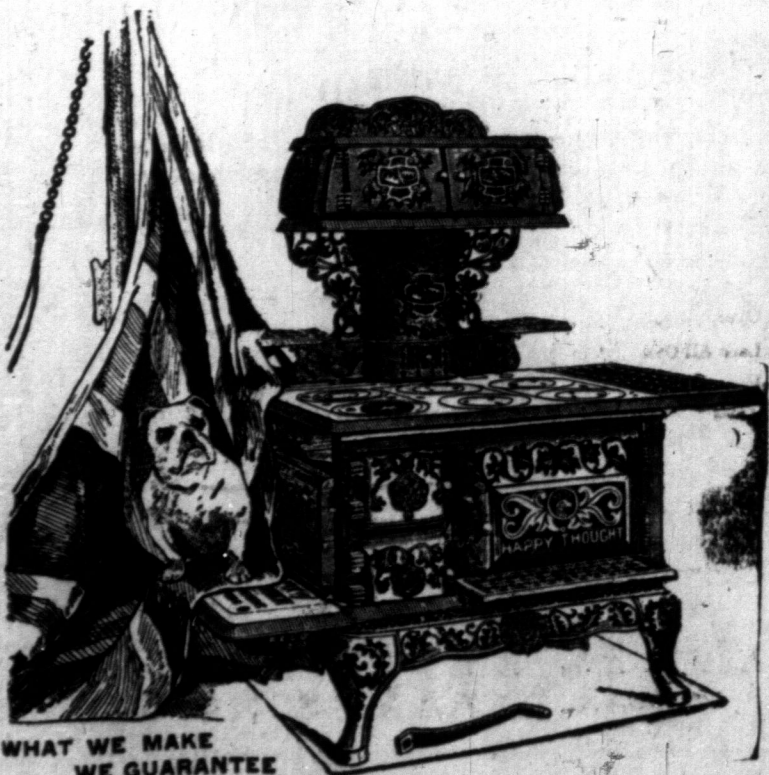

AT THE THEATRE. USED HER JAILERS.

The sale of seats for The Fadedettes ladies orchestra opened to subscribers this morning with a rush. The plan will be open to the general public to-morrow morning.

He then concluded that his patrons would be better suited with a choice between two performances on Saturday, than with election night, and so he is paying for two complete programs to-morrow. The Hamilton Times of Wednesday says concerning to-morrow's attraction at the Grand:

"Notwithstanding the tremendous counter attraction of the welcoming of 'Our Boys,' the 'Fadedettes' drew a large audience in Association Hall last evening. It was the second concert in the Metropolitan Entertainment Course, and fully as enjoyable as the first. The orchestra is composed of twenty-one young ladies, and they looked very charming on the platform, attired in handsome gowns of many colors. It was a unique spectacle to a Hamilton audience to see a pretty girl struggling with the ungainly slide trombone, or pursuing her lips to the needful shape to draw music from the flute. As a musical organization the Fadedettes are entitled to rank high. The volume of tone produced was of good quality and well balanced, and exacting selections from Wagner's 'Lohengrin' and the overture to 'Der Freischütz' were effectively played. The strings played two numbers with delightful precision and harmonic effect. Miss Caroline B. Nichols, the conductor, wields the baton gracefully and firmly, and has her young ladies schooled like veterans. Miss Charlotte Lynn, the soprano soloist, sang the recitative and olio, 'Farewell, Ye Hills' from the 'Maid of Orleans,' artistically. Her voice is finely cultivated and of considerable power. She was recalled. Miss Bertha Webb, a young violinist, played a Romance and allegro, (a la Zingari) by Wieniawski, and was encored."

RECEIVERS DISCHARGED.

St. Paul, Minn., Nov. 8.—Walter H. Sanborn, United States circuit judge, made an order to-day approving the final report of the receivers of the Union Pacific railway, and finally discharging them. The receivership, which has been thus closed, was, on account of its complications, one of the most involved and the most important in the great list of American railway bankruptcies. When it was commenced, Oct. 13, 1903, the Union Pacific system included 8,165 miles of rail lines, owed \$1,000,000,000, and had a capitalization of stock and bonds of \$470,000,000.
