Last night there was nothing of this kind standing in the way. Mr. Blonde and others presented a petition, which the Clerk announced had a sufficient number of signatures. But the matter was left over because the City Engineer's report was not in. This was rather peculiar in view of the fact that the consideration of this pavement has been before the Council for some weeks now. By-laws for pavements in other portions of the city have been rushed through in a single night.

One alderman wished the matter laid on the table, because of the fact that city expenditures are already very high this year, which action would be quite commendable had the would be quite commendable had the petition been unsufficiently signed. In view of all the circumstances, the unquestioned necessity for a payement on the street, the hardpavement on the street, the hardship which is inflicted on certain of the city's largest taxpayers and most influential citizens, and the additional fact that it is apparent that it is the will of the majority of the ratepayers on the street that it should be paved, the Council do not appear to have any excuse for this strange delay.

THE FISHERIES DISPUTE.

Anti-Government Loadon Papers Take
Advantage of It.

London, Aug. 26.—The conclusion to submit the Newfoundland fisheries dispute to arbitration at The Hague, and the negotiations pending with the view of a renewal of the modus vivendi to cover this year's fishing season, have called forth little comment here, except in the newspapers opposed to the Government, which attempt to make political capital out of the question, alleging that the Government is prepared to sacrifice the interests of the colony to maintain the good-will of the United States.

Even these papers, however, admit that the submission of the question to The Hague is the best solution to The Hague is the best solution available of the "wearisome controversy," and that some temporary arrangement must be made until the arbitrators render a decision.

The other papers apparently are awaiting some amnouncement from Foreign Secretary Grey, who thus far has declined to be drawn out by the members of Parliament, confining himself to the same reply to fall questions on the subject, namely, "the negotiations are proceeding."

The officials of the Foreign Office are confident that an arrangement, covering the present season and acceptable to all parties, shortly will be concluded.

The area used for sowing wheat and other autumn crops was somewhat greater throughout Ontario in the fall of 1906 than in that of 1905. At the Agricultural College this year winter wheat and winter rye have produced large yields of grain, which is above the average in quality, but the winter barley and the hairy vetches have given results somewhat lower than those of 1906.

Generally speaking, white wheats, as compared with red wheats, yield more grain per acre, possess stronger straw, weigh a little less per measured bushel, are slightly softer in the grain, produce a more popular The area used for sowing wheat

The results of many tests conducted at the College indicate the importance of sowing with a grain drill, large, piump, sound, well matured seed wheat at the rate of about a bushel and a half per acre on well prepared clover sod, and earlier if possible than the 10th of September. Smutted wheat should be immersed for twenty minutes in a solution of one pint of formalin and forty-two gallons of water.

The recent tests at the College of other classes of autumn sown crops show the following varieties to be the heaviest average yielders of grain per acre: Mammoth White Winter Barley 53.4 bushels, Hairy Vetches 5.7 bushels, and Black Winter Emmer. In the co-operative experiments, conducted throughout Ontario in 1907 under the direction of the Experimental Union, the average yields of grain per acre were as follows: Winter wheat, Imperial Amber 22.2

bushels, Abundance 21.7 bushels, and Michigan Amber 20.3 bushels, and of Winter Rye Mammoth 26.4 bushels, and Common 21.4 bushels.

As long as the supply lasts, material will be distributed free of charge in the order in which the applications are received from Ontario larmers wishing to experiment and to report the results of any one of the following tests: 1, Hairy Vetches and Winter Rye as fodder crops; 2, three varieties of Winter Wheat; 4, Autumn and Spring applications of Nitrate of Sody and Common Salt on Winter Wheat; 4, and 5, two varieon Winter Wheat; and 5, two varie on Winter Wheat; and 5, two varieties of Winter Rye., The size of each plot is to be one rod wide by two rods long. Material for numbers 3 and 4 will be sent by express and that for the others by mail.
