## FINANCING A RAILWAY

Speyer Bros. Issue Announcement in Wall Street Journal.

Very Full Details of the Grand Trunk Pacific Are Given For the Information of Interested Investors—Bonds Now Being Sold On Western Section of the Road, Which Is Divided Into Prairie and Mountain Divisions.

New York, Nov. 30.—Details of the Grand Trunk Pacific project are announced in connection with the financing of the road by Speyer Bros. The following announcement was made in The Wall Street Journal today:

The road is to be built in two divisions, the eastern from Montreal, N.B., to Winnipeg, 1,800 miles, and the western from Winnipeg to the Pacific, 1,500 miles. Rails are to be standard 75 and 80 pounds steel rail. Contract specifications for a line "on a standard not inferior to the main line of the Grand Trunk from Montreal to Toronto." The western division is to be completed by 1911.

The eastern division will be built by the Canadian Government under Grand Trunk supervision. The western division will be built by the Grand Trunk Pacific under Government supervision. When completed the entire line will be operated by the Grand Trunk.

The eastern division will be leased for fifty years on a rental equal to 3 per cent. of the cost, and at the end of that time Government may extend the lease or operate the road itself. At all times the Grand Trunk Pacific concedes a right of way to other systems as the Government dictates.

On the eastern division fifty-year 3 per cent. Government debentures will be issued. The Grand Trunk has nothing to do with the financing. The Grand Trunk Pacific will have nothing to do with the eastern division until it is ready for operation. After this date for several years no rental will be paid, this seven years interest being paid by the Government as a bonus.

The western division on which bonds are now being sold is divided into two sections, one prairie, the other mountain. On the prairie section the Government will guarantee 3 per cent. bonds up to 75 per cent. of cost not to exceed \$13,000 per mile. For the remainder of the cost the Grand Trunk Pacific will guarantee Grand Trunk Pacific second mortgage bonds. In case of a default the first three will get 75 per cent. and the second bonds 25 per cent. of net revenue.

On the mountain division the Government will pay the interest on bonds up to 75 per cent. of cost, not stipulated as to amount, for the first seven years. All western bonds are to be dated on the completion of the property, equipped and ready for operation. When this is done the first mortgage debt will be 3 per cent. guaranteed bonds. The second mortgage, representing additional cost, may bear any interest. Of the stock \$25,000,000 may be preferred and \$25,000,000 common. The latter goes to the Grand Trunk, which will thus control the new property.

### WANTS DUTIES LOWERED.

Ken. John Dryden's Mission to Chicago Live Stock Show.

Chicago, Nov. 30.—Hon. John Dryden, Ontario Minister of Agriculture, arrived yesterday to attend the stock show. He expects to meet Secretary of Agriculture Wilson, who is on the way from Washington to-day, and have a conference with him. One of the subjects which Minister Dryden plans to take up with Secretary Wilson is the need of revising the tariff on Canadian imports.

"The tariff wall should be lowered," said the Canadian Minister. "The great expense of shipping cattle from Canada to the United States has in a measure restricted our export at the stock show. Canada is flourishing and the burden of raising country of the Northwest is harder than the products of land further south and is better."

Minister Dryden would have exhibited his prize shorthorn bull, Prince Gloucester, but decided not to pay the tariff duties.

### Earl of Hardwick Dead.

London, Nov. 30.—The Earl of Hardwick (Albert Edward Philip Yorke), Under Secretary of State for India, died suddenly in London yesterday. He had been in poor health for some time, but his death was not expected. The Earl, who was born in 1867, was known as a stock broker. His father had a magnificent estate, but he ran through the property, left his son practically penniless and the latter had to adopt a city career as a means of making a livelihood.

### No Blame For Anyone.

Toronto, Nov. 30.—The verdict of the coroner's jury appointed to hold an inquest on the bodies of the fourteen men recently killed by an outburst of gas in No. 1 Mine, Carbonado, in British Columbia, was handed out yesterday and was to the effect that death was due to suffocation and that no blame attached to anyone.

### TORONTO LIVE STOCK.

Receipts of live stock at the City Market were 85 carloads, composed of 1106 cattle, 560 hogs, 2357 sheep and lambs, with about 50 calves. There was little doing in the shipping class, excepting a few cows and bulls. Cows sold at about \$5.50 and bulls at \$3.50 to \$5.75 per cwt. A very few choice butchers' sold at from \$4.25 to \$4.50; loads of good at \$3.75 to \$4.00; fair to good, \$3.50 to \$3.75; medium at \$3.25 to \$3.50; culls, \$2.50 to \$3; rough to inferior, \$2 to \$2.50; canners, \$1.25 to \$1.75 per cwt.

The demand for feeders was fair, but not as great as has been; but several farmers and dealers were on the market buying. A. C. Becker of Arx bought one load, about 1200 lbs. each, for which he paid \$3.40 to \$3.75, and they were of good quality. The bulk of feeders sold at from \$2.50 to \$3.50. Stockers sold at from \$2.25 to \$2.50 for fair quality, and eastern bred at \$1.75 to \$2. Feeding bulls sold at from \$2.50 to \$2.75 per cwt.

About 20 milch cows and springers sold all the way from \$30 to \$60 each, with a good demand for those of choice quality. Veal calves of good quality are in demand at from \$5.25 to \$5.75 per cwt., but inferior to common sell at \$3.50 to \$4.50 per cwt. McDonald & Mayhew sold 12 calves at \$3.50 to \$5.75 per cwt. Deliveries of sheep and lambs were fairly large—nearly 2400—but, notwithstanding this fact, prices were a little firmer, as follows: Sheep at \$3.75 per cwt.; lambs at \$4.50 per cwt.; picked lots of ewes and wethers at \$5 to \$5.10 per cwt.

Deliveries of about 1000 sold at \$4.80 for select and \$4.55 for lights and fats.

### Fall Ploughing in West.

Winnipeg, Nov. 30.—The C. P. R. yesterday completed the preparation of a special report on fall ploughing throughout the west. The report shows an increase in areas broken for 1904 of from 20 to 25 per cent. In general as compared with the fall ploughing done in 1903. Only a few points show a decrease, while districts along the Prince Albert branch report extraordinary percentages of increase, running as high as 1,000 per cent. at Kenaston. These figures came from newly settled districts.

### With Kruger's Body.

Cape Town, Nov. 30.—The Dutch steamer Batavier, having on board the body of Paul Kruger, former president of the Transvaal Republic, arrived here yesterday almost unnoticed. The remains will lie in state here, and will leave for Pretoria, Dec. 7, on a special train, which will stop at most of the railroad stations on the way there.
