

Paris, June 18.—Speaking on Sunday of the new French-Spanish and British-Spanish treaties, the signature of which virtually creates a new triple alliance, M. Pichon, Minister of Foreign Affairs, said:

"Such arrangements are the best guarantees of peace that can be conceived. Our agreement with Spain is surely pacific. It accords with the interests as well as the sympathies of both nations. Its intent is purely pacific, the object being to assure the status quo of that region, which could not be altered without injury to the two contracting signatories, and the security of the communications of the respective outlying territories, which is especially important in the case of our possessions in Africa, and on both the Atlantic and Mediterranean coasts."
