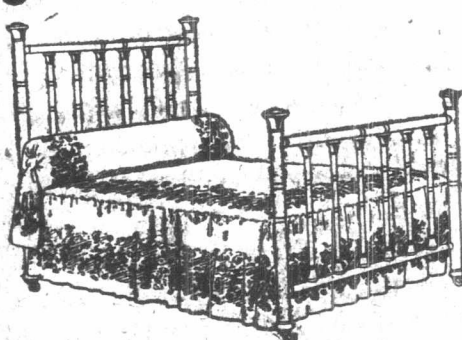

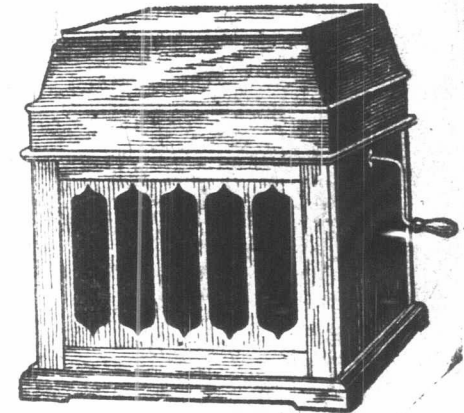
To the Electors of the Parish of Wakefield
