Apparently about all that has been done in the matter of organization has been the publication of the notice in the Chatham World calling a Convention for the County to be held at Chatham on October first, 1920 to nominate INDEPEND ENT Candidates.

The lack of organization upon th part of the Conservative Party, the apathy of its leaders and the vigorcus campaing carried out by Mr Mor-rissy in his own interests, have resuffed in his nomination as a Candi date by his supporters who predominated at the Chatham Convention.

We sympathize with the aims and the aspirations of the Farmer well as the Labor classes to better their condition but at the same time we think that their interests have been well looked after by the Conservative Party. Jt does not appear to us to be good policy for any particular class to have representatives in Parliament elected to represent their particular class.
