Large Increase in Railway Debt

Interest due the public on debt of the Canadian National Railways and affiliated companies in 1923 amounted to \$34,126,065 and interest to the government to \$30,157,943, or a total of \$64,284,009, in addition to this amount, interest on unfunded debt was \$126,725. Hon. George P. Graham, Minister of Railways and Canals, answering a series of questions by Sir Henry Drayton, in the House of Commons yesterday, stated that the debt of the Canadian National Railways and affiliated companies had increased by \$116,292,636 in 1923. Of this amount \$97,437,233 was a debt to the government, and \$14,855,402 debt to the public. In the previous year the addition to the debt of the government system was \$59,621,000, and in 1921 \$133,193,254.

Save The Forest Week Observed In The Province

Save the Forest Week was observed last week in New Brunswick as part of a general Dominion-wide campaign to keep public interest in the conservation of the forests at a high point. Education along those lines has had results and it is desired to maintain the standard.

On Saturday the distribution of campaign literature was made in all towns and cities. On Monday night radio fans were given two addresses on the subject broadcasted by the Canadian National Railways station at Moncton, CNRA. The speeches were by Premier Veniot and Hon. J. E. Hetherington the latter Acting Minister of Lands and Mines.

During the week all institutions, businesses and persons interested in lumbering, hunting, fishing and forest conservation, assisted in the campaign.

Accident to industrial disturbance in Cape Breton, that of the people of Peterborough is outstanding in its importance and in the genuinely spontaneous manner in which private citizens and industrial firms responded to the appeal.

A carload of food and other necessities has been shipped from this Ontario city to Glace Bay, the result of effort of the Citizen's Relief Committee and the local Women's Council.

ROBT. S. B. CROMBIE DEAD AT TORONTO

Former Bank of Montreal Manager at Chatham.

A former New Brunswick bank manager has passed away in Toronto by the death of Robert Shaw Bradshaw Crombie, who was connected with the Bank of Montreal for more than forty-five years, and in the course of his long career was manager of the branches at Chatham, New Brunswick, and at Pictou, Belle ville and Kingston in Ontario. A son of the late Marcus Crombie; he was born in Toronto; eighty years ago educated at Upper Canada College and started his career with the Bank of Montreal; from which he retired only fifteen years ago. He was a member of the Church of England and in Toronto attended St. James' Cathedral. His death took place, Tuesday at his home; 10 Huntley street; Toronto. Surviving him are his wife; who was Miss Benson; of Chatham; New Brunswick; three sons; W. B. Crombie; Iroquois Falls; R. L. Crombie; Montreal and J. L. Crombie Toronto; Your daughters Mrs. G. Cox; Montreal; Mrs. T. J. Palmer; Ottawa and Mrs. W. W. Kirk; New Jersey; and Miss Constance; and one brother; David; Toronto.

Town Council Names Committees

Pursuant to notice a special meeting of the Town Council of the Town of Newcastle was held in the Town Office on Friday; April 24th 1925; at 8 o'clock p. m. Present:—Mayor Russett; Ald. Armstrong, Atkinson, Creaghan, Mackay; Ritchie; Sargeant; Smallwood and Stables.

The Town Clerk read the report of the election and on motion the same was adopted as recorded.

It was moved and seconded that the mayor appoint a nominating committee for the appointment of standing committees for the ensuing year and the Mayor appointed Ald. Ritchie, Armstrong, Creaghan as such committee. Council was given intermission to allow the committee to prepare a report.

On the Council re-assembling the following report was presented:—To the Mayor and Members of the Town Council

Gentlemen,—Your Nominating Committee beg to recommend the appointment of the following committees for the ensuing year.

Finance:—Ald. Mackay, Atkinson and Smallwood.

Public Works:—Ald. Creaghan, Sargeant, Armstrong.

Light & Water & Sewerage:—Ald. Ritchie, Mackay; Armstrong.

Police & App. to Office:—Ald. Smallwood, Atkinson; Creaghan.

Park & Fire:—Ald. Sargeant, Stables, Ritchie.

Bye Law and Licensing:—Ald. Atkinson, Sargeant, Armstrong.

Industrial and Publicity:—The Mayor with the whole Council.

It was moved by Ald. Mackay, seconded by Ald. Smallwood and carried that the report be received and discussed.

After some discussion it was moved by Ald. Smallwood, seconded by Ald. Ritchie and carried that the report of the Nominating Committee be received and adopted. The different committees met to appoint their Chairman.

The Finance Com. reported that they could not agree on the appointment of a Chairman as none of the members would accept the appointment and the three resigned from that committee.

It was moved by Ald Ritchie, seconded by Ald Stables that the Mayor appoint a Committee to select a Finance Com. The Mayor again appointed Aids. Armstrong, Ritchie and Creaghan such committee: The Committee recommended the appointment of Ald. Ritchie, Creaghan and Armstrong as Finance Committee and on motion of Ald Atkinson this recommendation was adopted.

The different Committees then reported the appointment of their respective chairmen as follows:—

Finance—Ald. Ritchie

Public Works—Ald. Creaghan

L. W. & Sewerage—Ald. Ritchie

Police & App. to Office—Ald. Smallwood.

Park & Fire—Ald. Stables

Bye Law & Licensing—Ald. Atkinson.

A letter was received from A. E. Petrie, Sanitary Inspector of the Board of Health for the Town of Newcastle, calling the attention of the Town Council to the advisability and necessity of keeping the Town Dump, the Town Property in rear of the Town Hall, the head of Radio street and the old Commons in a sanitary condition and same was referred to the Public Works Committee for attention. The committee appointed to arrange with the Canada Creosote Co. Ltd. for a water main was given an extension of time.

Ald. Creaghan drew the attention of the Council to the fact that some towns were selling property for taxes with an option of redemption within two years and after discussion the Finance Com. was authorized to take the matter up with the Town Solicitor to ascertain if such a law would be applicable to Newcastle.

Ald. Armstrong gave notice that at the next regular meeting he would move for the passage of a bye-law governing the erection and location of buildings in certain areas of the town, where the placing of such buildings would cause a depreciation of adjoining properties or become a fire menace or nuisance and that the Town Solicitor be instructed to draw up said bye-law. On motion the Council adjourned.

Postage Increases On Parcels To U. S.

Rise is Two Cents a Pound and Will Become Effective May 1

A two-cent a pound increase in the rate of parcel postage for the United States has been announced and will be effective on May 1. The increase has been made by the United States postal authorities with a view to meeting the cost of the service. The same rates will apply for parcels mailed in the United States and addressed to Canada and will be 14 cents a pound. The rates will be as follows: One pound, 14c.; two pounds, 28c.; three pounds 42c.; four pounds, 56c.; five pounds, 70c.; six pounds, 84c.; seven pounds, 98c.; eight pounds, \$1.12; nine pounds, \$1.26; ten pounds, \$1.40; and eleven pounds \$1.54.
