### LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

Rev. J. J. Mahon of Brooklyn, N. Y., who is spending a few weeks vacation here is staying at the Hotel Esplanade.

BUCKE Stewart & Co. have an order from Willard Kitchen, for the construction of a car, with a 20 ton capacity, for carrying rails over the Branch Railway.

Mr. Raphael McCormack, contractor of Boston, who with Mrs. McCormack had been visiting Souris left for home on Monday last. Mrs. McCormack remains for some weeks longer.

Owing to lack of accommodation on the transport Ceatran, 34 officers and 235 non-commissioned officers and men of the Mounted Rifles are remaining in South Africa, awaiting transportation to Canada.

The new flagship Crescent, Admiral Douglas, now at Halifax, is the fastest cruiser that was ever placed on this sea, reaching 25 miles an hour. It is likely that she will visit Charlottetown before the summer is over.

REYDS, J. Clatroux and J. E. Laforce, professors in Joliette College, in the diocese of Montreal, together with Mr. George Robitaille, student of the same College are spending a brief vacation in Charlottetown. They are guests at the Hotel Esplanade.

A VANCOUVER, B. C., despatch of the 16th inst., says: W. A. Gilmore, law partner of Sir Herbert Tupper and Mr. Fred Peters, died suddenly last evening from convulsions. He was 41 years old, and only married Miss Turner, of Hamilton, on June 4th.

The Steamer Bonaville, sailed from this port on Friday for St. John's, N. B., with a cargo consisting of 650 bags oats, 100 bags potatoes, 40 crates turnips, 392 cords hardwood plank, 150 boxes butter, 100 boxes cheese, 69 head cattle, 1 horse, 59 sheep and sundry other freight.

A SUDDEN ROLL OF LIE OF SHOALS, N. B., on Thursday upset a pleasure boat containing sixteen persons. Fourteen were drowned, two men and twelve women. The women who lost their lives were all waitresses of the Oceanic Hotel at that place. Nine bodies have been recovered.

Srs Joseph Ignatius Little, Chief Justice of New Brunswick died at St. John's, N.B., on the 14th inst. Deceased was a Catholic, a native of Charlottetown, and was sixty six years of age. He was married. He has been described as "an honorable man, a conscientious judge, respected by all classes and creeds."

The residence of Mr. James Monaghan, at Kelly's Cross, was burned to the ground on Sunday morning with all its contents. The family had barely time to escape with their lives. The residence was a splendid farm house and was only partially insured. Mr. Monaghan is a brother of Rev. Father Monaghan of this city.

Reports received from all parts of Manitoba indicate that the year's grain crop will again be a record breaker. The season is several days later than last year, but the grain looks even better. This does not refer to districts, but to the whole Province. The crop will be ready for harvesting before the first week in August.

At the Police Court on Saturday a young woman named Emma Mahoney was convicted on a charge of obtaining goods under false pretences from the firm of Moore & McLeod. She pretended that the goods obtained by her were for a woman in whose employ she had formerly been. The value of the goods amounted to almost forty dollars. She was sentenced to two months imprisonment in jail.

Mr. James Sherry, Sea Cow Head, met with a painful accident a few days ago while standing in Wright's mill, Beedon, a slab which was being carried out accidentally touched the circular saw and was whirled through the air with the force of a bullet, striking Mr. Sherry and breaking his leg in five places. He was as soon as possible placed under skillful medical treatment. Owing to the serious nature of the injury, it was at first feared that it would be necessary to amputate the leg, but hopes are still entertained that it may be saved.

In this issue will be found the advertisement of the Scottish gathering to be held at Summerside on August 20th. In reference to the railway fares it will be noticed that excursion tickets at one way second class fare will be issued at all stations east of Royalton Junction, instead of one way first class fare, as stated in posters. These rates are good going on the 20th, and good for return on the 21st, instead of the 6th and 8th. These latter were the dates first intended and through inadvertency were not changed in posters.

A MAN named John Gregory residing near Souris, brought a lad 13 years of age, to the Police Court several days ago, on the charge that the lad had been disorderly and threatened to kill him and at times had threatened to commit suicide. The lad is one of a lot of English orphans who were brought here some years ago from an orphanage in Birmingham. He has been with Gregory three years. The magistrate gave the boy some advice and told Gregory to take him back and give him another chance at the farm. We have not heard the boy's side of the story.

This regular fortnightly meeting of the Cheese Board was held Friday morning with a good attendance of salesmen. The buyers present were Messrs Henry Aitken, A. J. Biffin, R. E. Spillet, Geo. Wheatley, Geo. E. Auld, Horace Hazen. The subcommittee read: Montreal firm, English market firm and advancing. Montreal 94 to 92, London 45 to 49, Brookville 99 to 100 firm and active. The cheese board was as follows: Lakeville 120, Stanley Bridge 280, St. Peter's 160, Cornwall 200, New Glasgow 210, New Dominion 235, Union 177, Orwell 230, Cardigan 70, Red Point 75, Red House 110, Hillsboro 200, New Perth 200, Dunstaffnage 155, Mount Stewart 90, Hazelbrook 150, Gowan Brae 85, Kensington 350, Dundas 150, Winsloe 140, East River 108, Wiltshire 115. The highest bid was 94 by Mr. Biffin. His offer was accepted by St. Peter's, Orwell, Dunstaffnage, Hillsboro, Winsloe, St. George's Mt. Stewart, East River, Lakeville, Gowan Brae and Dundas. At the same time Mr. Spillet purchased Stanley Bridge, Red Point, New Perth, Red House and Cardigan. The third bid was 99 1/2 by Mr. Wheatley, but the remaining factories declined to sell. The next meeting will be on August 1st.

### LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

It is now said that the Coronation will take place on August 9th.

ADVISED from London announce that Earl Cadogan has resigned the Lord Lieutenantcy of Ireland.

At the League of the Cross picnic held at Midgell on Monday. Wm. Halfpenny broke the Maritime record for pole vaulting going 10 feet, 2 1/2 inches.

The schooner Clifton sailed from North Sydney on Friday with 2,600 quintals of codfish for Oporto, Portugal. The cargo is valued at \$13,000.

Mr. Peter A. McIntyre and wife of New York are visiting the Island. They are at present enjoying the hospitality of Mr. McIntyre's native home at Cable Head.

We are glad to know that Mr. Daniel Sinnott, who was severely injured a few days ago while breaking in a young horse, is making very good progress towards recovery.

The S. S. Winnifred arrived at Halifax early yesterday morning with another lot of South African soldiers, including the heroes of the Hart's River fight, and the Field Hospital Corps. They got a great reception on landing at Halifax. Major H. D. Johnston and the other islanders are expected to arrive by the Princess this evening.

The decision in the application of Neil McQuarrie, K. C., for the removal of George Gillman from the common jail of Prince County was given on Friday at Georgetown. It was ordered by the Court that the Sheriff of Prince County receive the prisoner into his custody, there to await his trial at the next sitting of the Court.

A LONDON despatch says: Admiral Lord Charles Beresford advises helping Canada with a last steamship route. With a British combine for the Atlantic trade it would surely knock Piermont Morgan's plans on the head. The Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company announce they will send commercial messages to Canada before December. The rate will be 60 words for private messages and 30 for press messages.

SPAKING at a dinner at the Canada Club in London a few days ago, reference to the confederation of Newfoundland and Canada was brought up by Premier Barton, of Australia. Sir Robert Bond said: If the terms are advantageous to the people of Newfoundland, he would lay the proposal before the people of the colony, and if necessary exert himself to bring confederation about.

The retreat for the clergy of this diocese will commence at St. Dunstan's College on Monday next, 28th inst. The retreat will be conducted by Rev. Neil McKinnon, S. J. of New York. During the retreat four priests will be stationed at different points of the Province as follows: Rev. T. E. Cullen at Charlottetown, Rev. J. J. Mahon at Summerside, Rev. J. St. Julien at St. John's and Rev. J. P. McGrath at Fighish.

The foreman, typewriter and machine operators of the Halifax Chronicle went out last Wednesday because a man was employed who was objectionable to them. The Chronicle has managed to appear daily as usual, although working short-handed. The publishers say that the employees had not the slightest justification for their action, and did not give them a moment's notice. A new staff is being organized.

The automobile arrived here on Thursday night from Boston by the S. S. Halifax. The company intend establishing a belt line through the city, the fare to be five cents a ride, and ten cents to Victoria Park and return. The fare to the Cliff Hotel and return will likely be \$1.50. The auto. is fitted with a gasoline fuel steam engine and has a capacity for 160 gallons of gasoline and 60 gallons of water. The tanks are renewed once a day.

DONALD J. McDonald, a native of Valleyfield, P. E. I., was accidentally killed near Boston last week. The deceased was employed as a switchman on the Providence division of the New York and New Hampshire Railroad, and it appears that while throwing the switch he slipped and fell beneath the car. The wheels passed over both legs, his head was badly cut and two fingers were severed from his right hand. He was removed to the Massachusetts General Hospital, where he died one hour after. A widow is left to mourn.

AN Ottawa despatch of the 18th inst. says: A heavy thunder storm struck the city at 5 o'clock yesterday, blowing down Day's large skating rink. The roof flew across the street, blocking the way and destroying the telegraph lines. Lightning struck the McKee tower of Parliament Building, but glanced off without doing any damage. On the same night an awful tornado swept over Chertsville township, Quebec, killing five persons and destroying crops, live stock and buildings to the extent of two hundred thousand dollars. The killed were: Mrs. Kearns and seven year old son, Mrs. McGregor, Mrs. Hart and Wm. Brickstead.
