# Cable News.

**LONDON, Nov. 13.**  
 The present month is the mildest November for 14 years. The winds are tropical, blowing from an arc between the Azores and West Africa. So spring-like is the weather that primroses, violets, poppies and crows are in full bloom, while in some districts farmers have already some spring corn. Ripe strawberries have been picked by the Monks of Princess Riseborough, Buckinghamshire, and second crops of raspberries and strawberries are being gathered at Histon, near Cambridge. At Covent Garden yesterday, raspberries, grown out of doors, were selling at 18 cents a basket.

**SOFIA, Nov. 13.**  
 Bulgaria has sent through the French legation an ultimatum to Greece, demanding, first, that the persecution of Bulgarians in Macedonia cease; second, that autonomous rights be accorded to Bulgarian churches and schools in Macedonia, such as they enjoyed under Turkish rule; third, that permission be granted to Macedonian Bulgarians who fled from the reign of terror to return, unmolested, to their homes; and, fourth, that all Bulgarian prisoners in Greece be released, and that all prisoners of war be allowed to return. The Bulgarian ultimatum is couched in strong language, and places a limit of eight days for its acceptance.

**WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.**  
 Proposals made to the Mexican constitutionalists through William Hale, President Wilson's personal representative, and the final demand that the new Mexican Congress be dissolved, because of the question as to its legality, transmitted through John Lind, in Mexico City, have brought the situation forward another step. Through their unofficial envoys the United States, without formally addressing either faction, has made another move to bring about a settlement of the revolutionary troubles in the Southern republic. A rejection by Huerta might involve an abrupt termination of all relations with him, extending, possibly, to the withdrawal of the American Embassy officials. The U.S. Government is desirous that the revolution be settled by the contenders themselves.

**LONDON, Nov. 13.**  
 The enrollment of the suffragette army was started at Bow in the East End of London, when 300 men and women were asked to make a declaration worded thus: "I promise to serve the common cause of justice and our comrades under our duly elected officers. I will be friend and brother to every member of this peace army. I am a sincere believer in universal adult suffrage." Not a single army officer or several constables were present, but Zelle Emmerson announced that the new army would have as instructor a soldier who has served his country in Egypt.

**LONDON, Nov. 13.**  
 The Czartitch, only son of Czar Nicholas, cannot live more than six months. Such is the opinion of the most distinguished surgeons here, who have been called into consultation over the boy, now in his tenth year. They say he is suffering from rapid tuberculosis of the bone, and is incurable. Of course no one dare whisper this at St. Petersburg, but the Czar knows his son is in an extremely precarious condition. He cannot walk, and an orderly carries him, when he appears in public.

**TORONTO, Nov. 13.**  
 Insurance underwriters today gave out the following estimates of losses by storm: Value of cargoes, \$1,000,000; value of ships, \$2,500,000. Total losses, at least 10 vessels, and 161 lives, as the result of the great blizzard that enveloped the Great Lakes from Sunday to Tuesday. In addition 21 other vessels have been partially or wholly destroyed, their crews escaping.

**ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 13.**  
 The Duma has rejected a proposal, designed to give rights to Jewish subjects of the Czar, equal to those enjoyed by all others. The bill was introduced by Mr. Shergaroff, who urged the appointment of a Committee to draft a bill conferring on all Russian subjects equal rights before the law. The proposal was rejected by 152 to 92.

**PORT HURON, Nov. 13.**  
 The steamer John A. McGeehan, of Cleveland, one of the largest of the Great Lake steamers, was lost Sunday. She passed here, bound up at 3.10 a.m. Sunday. This was the last heard of her.

**FORT WILLIAM, Nov. 13.**  
 The ss. Norton, which left Whitefish on Saturday, at noon, has not yet arrived, and it is feared that she has been lost. The Norton was a steel freighter, and carried 5,000 tons of coal for here.
