CASEMENT'S PENSION SUSPENDED

LONDON, To-day. Sir Edward Grey, Foreign Secretary, announced in the Commons to-day that Sir Roger Casement's pension had been suspended pending an investigation into the allegations that he was disloyal. Reports last November that Sir Roger, leader of a separatist faction in Ireland, had gone to Berlin to confer with the German Imperial authorities caused a sensation in England. The despatch from Berlin which was attributed to the German Foreign Office said it was Sir Roger's intention to open negotiations between the German Government and the anti-English party in Ireland.

THE SUGAR EMBARGO.

LONDON, To-day. The prohibition of the sale of American sugar in this country was brought up in the Commons to-day by Sir James Duffell who said that he was a neutral country should be benefited by sending sugar here to the embarrassment of British manufacturers. Home Secretary McKenna replied that sugar imported from America would be replaced with supplies obtained from the enemy of the British. "No war is this case," Sir James retorted. "I have documentary proof of it," McKenna said. He added prohibition would not be removed so long as the neutral would benefit the enemy of England.

NO LIVES LOST.

WASHINGTON, To-day. The U.S. Navy Dept. for information regarding the wreck of the Asama at San Diego. The Japanese cruiser Asama was reported wrecked near Turtle Bay, less than 40 miles from where the steamship Miam and Danish motor ship Maja went on the rocks on Dec. 18. The Asama struck on or before last Monday and is now a total wreck. Although no lives were lost, according to reports received here.

LONDON, To-day. Although the Morning Post and other London daily papers repeatedly have urged a blockade of German ports, thus cutting off all cotton and foodstuffs, the British Foreign Office yesterday has made it clear that its policy is the same to-day as in the past. It is added that the British Government has no thought of antagonizing neutral countries whose shipping would be stopped by the closing of the Baltic Sea.

CAIRO SAYS 12,000.

LONDON, To-day. War's Enoch Arden Back With Bride.

New York, Jan. 28.—Clad in deep mourning for the husband on whose happy arm she leaned, there tripped down the gangplank of the steamship Camerona from Glasgow, the most joyous young woman who ever figured in a drama. Enoch Arden, with Enoch finding a welcome instead of another man in his place.

It was last June that Capt. James Mackay Oswald of the Seventh Royal Fusiliers, a Scotch regiment, obtained a furlough and crossed the Atlantic to visit kinsmen in St. Paul, Minn. There he fell in love with Miss Davina McRoberts, a winsome Scotch lassie. They were married in July and sailed for Scotland on a honeymoon.

The captain installed his bride in a home in Dundee, and there they were happy until the war began. The Fusiliers was one of the first companies to be hurried into France. Then came a night assault, and in the melee, Capt. Oswald was desperately wounded. He was found among a pile of dead and wounded, and believing him to be dead, the sergeant in charge of the searching party took from him his identification badge. In time this reached England, and he was officially counted as among the killed. Meanwhile a field surgeon had come across the unconscious body, and finding signs of life had caused the captain to be removed to a field hospital. Then, still unconscious, he was transported to Dover, where he lay undisturbed and unconscious for many weeks. At last the began to recover, and on his discharge from hospital on January 9, hurried to Dundee only to find the little home closed and learn that his wife had gone to Ayr. Hastening there he learned that she, believing him dead, had gone, leaving no address.

He cabled to her old home in St. Paul. The reply was that she had booked passage by the Camerona. The captain hurried to Glasgow and arrived there just as the gangplank was being made ready for lowering. Mrs. Oswald wore her mourning garb throughout the voyage, for she had no other. But as soon as the two came to land, they hurried to the shopping district, the young wife wanting something more suitable to the sunshine which had come back so unexpectedly into her life.

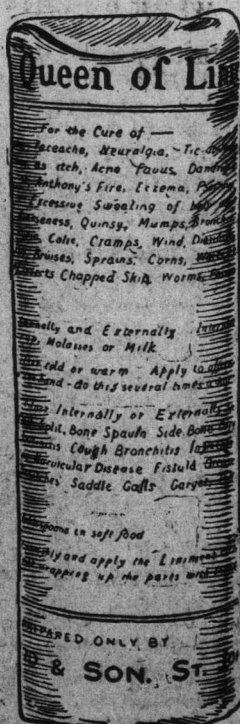

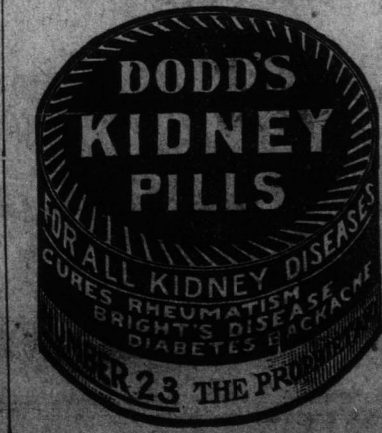
