I am very sorry indeed that he has

died. He lies buried in the Military Cemetery close by and a small oak cross marks his grave, on which is inscribed his Name, Number and Regiment.

The Cemetery is beautifully situated on the borders of a pinewood and overlooks the broad ocean.

I cannot say any more to you as a stranger as it would be quite useless, but as Officer Commanding this Hospital, I thought it was right to drop you this short note.

New Citadel Formally Opened.

The new and elaborately fitted Salvation Army Citadel, on Adelaide Street, was formally opened for service last night by Col. McMillan, of Toronto, who performed the dedication service. His Excellency the Governor, Sir C. Alexander Harris, presided, and on the platform with him besides the Staff Officers were Miss Armory Harris, Capt. Campbell, A.D.C., Hon. Dr. Lloyd, Premier; Hon. W. W. Hartyard, Hon. W. F. Coaker, Min. of Militia, J. R. Bennett; Hon. R. A. Squires, Mr. Meads, C.M.G.; Mr. C. E. Hunt, Mr. F. Steer, Mr. I. C. Morris, U. S. Consul Benedict and Mrs. Benedict.

Following the singing of the Hymn "O God our help in Ages Past" with prayer by Staff-Captain Turner, His Excellency in a brief address referred to the Salvation Army abroad and what he had heard of its operations here. He congratulated the local staff on having raised such a beautiful edifice to the glory of God and gave some encouraging words to the future work of the provincial staff under its chief executive, Lieut. Col. Otway.

Following the dedication, Lt.-Col. Otway gave the building statement which showed that the site and building cost approximately \$10,000 which amount had practically all been raised by voluntary subscription. The members of Livingstone Street, barracks having contributed very largely. His Excellency who was due at the C. L. B. Armoury to attend another function retired.

Hon. Dr. Lloyd, Premier, then took the chair and in a brief address congratulated the Army on their new building and gave a few instances where the Army's Nerve Food, where other churches failed.
