THE ALLIES IN RUSSIA.

LONDON, To-day. The Allied Armies Expeditionary Force has reached Petrograd, 100 miles south of Archangel, on the road toward Volodga. It is announced here that Bolshevik forces retiring are declared to have committed every form of atrocity on the Russian population. Fairly determined resistance to the Allied advance is offered by the Bolsheviks, and progress of the Expeditionary Force was delayed. Allied forces have been handed along the shores of Onega Bay, one hundred miles south of Archangel, for the purpose of intercepting the Bolshevik forces retreating from Archangel. It is learned

PRISONERS AND GUNS TAKEN.

LONDON, To-day. According to unofficial estimates, the Germans captured in the recent offensive by the British Fourth Army, and the French First and Third Armies, total 34,000, while thus far 670 have been captured. Of these the British took 30,000 prisoners and guns. There is clear evidence of demoralizing effect of the tanks on the enemy. Where previously the Germans offered stubborn resistance, this as they surrendered almost as soon as the tanks got near them.

LOSSES LESS THAN CAPTURES.

LONDON, To-day. The proportion of the German losses those of the Allies, since August 8, greater than at any other period of war, it was announced here to-day. It is said that the total Allied casualties probably will not be as great as the number of Germans taken.

TANKS AT VLADIVOSTOK.

WASHINGTON, To-day. American troops to-day began to embark at Vladivostok and will immediately join the international force to aid the Czechs-Slovak army in campaign in Siberia. The American force is composed of the 77th Infantry Regiment from Manila and will be followed by another Regiment from the Philippines and additional troops from the United States.

ON THE ITALIAN FRONT.

WASHINGTON, To-day. American troops last night established themselves in high positions in the mountains of the Italian Front in Valcamonica, while their artillery continued to fire on the important Austrian defense positions. The following official report of Italian operations was received at the Embassy to-day from Rome: Italian Front in Valcamonica and Valcamonica. While an intense fire of our artillery is still concentrated on the most important positions of the enemy defense, our troops are establishing themselves on the summits which they took from the enemy in Valcamonica and on the heights of the Italian Front. The activity of the artillery on both sides has been lively between the mountains and the Piave. At dawn on the 9th our detachments crossed the river and occupied one of the great Italian heights of the river, making prisoners of the Italian army of forty men. The occupation has been held in spite of continuous attacks by enemy troops, and of a violent barrage fire.

ARE AMERICANS FOR EUROPE.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15. The draft programme and plans of the War Department are of such a character that the rapid movement of troops to France is continuing. Secretary Baker said to-day, and by reason of the very great assistance given by the British Government in placing much shipping at the disposal of the American Government, the movement of men overseas would not be interrupted. Fourteen National Divisions are already in France. Secretary said, and these have been included in the new field army organization.

FRENCH MAKE GAINS.

PARIS, Aug. 15. Further gains have been made by the French in the wooded region between the Meuse and Oise Rivers, and north of the Oise and Ribecourt. According to the French communiqué of this evening, the enemy has been driven back, the operations have been of a minor character. The text of the communiqué follows. During the night of the 14th, minor operations enabled us to make progress in the wooded region between the Meuse and Oise. We have captured the north-west of Ribecourt and the Farm, and the Monolite Farm, which were energetically defended by the enemy. We made some prisoners.

IN THE EAST.

ARMY OF THE EAST, Aug. 14. The health of King Ferdinand of Serbia, who is at Naum, suddenly became worse, according to a despatch received here from Munich. His condition now is considered critical.

I once had the pleasure of hearing two women talk with rather surprising frankness about a man whom both of them had liked. The one whom he had married was talking to the other, who, after the passing of her crush, it had been no more than that, had married another man.

"Richard," she said (Richard is the man in the case, of course), "admits you immensely; he thinks you are terrible clever and he really makes me quite jealous when he talks to people about you and your painting. But you never would have gotten along together, you are so different. You are always moving about, and he likes to settle down in one place; and you are so fond of arguing and he simply hates an argument."

She didn't marry Richard. A little smile appeared on the other woman's face as she listened. "My dear," she said, "you forget that I didn't marry Richard, I should not be just the same woman I am after five years of married life with another man."

"You don't mean to say that you, a suffragist, think a woman is 'what the man she marries, make her'?"

"Not at all. What I mean is that both husbands and wives are partly their original selves, and partly what the reactions of life with each other has made them."

SELECTING THE HAIR BRUSH.

Brushes each day remove dirt and grime from the scalp and hair therefore they in turn should be rid of this accumulation. Powder for cleansing brushes are on the market, but a daily dipping up and down in a little ammoniated water, then placing to dry, bristles down, in sun, and air, will keep brushes white, soft and clean.

The best comb is never sharp on the edges of the teeth, nor is it finely set. It is of hard rubber with teeth well shaped and rounded at their sides. A white comb is the one that necessarily has to be kept more clean than any other, and in this way it is the best color to choose.

Do not use the brush rapidly or press upon it too hard. Remember that the object of using a hair brush is to remove dust, all dead cuticle thrown off by the scalp and to stimulate the circulation as well as to distribute the delicate oil secreted by the glands found in the scalp.

Ethie Brings Report of Herring.

Herring have struck in on the Labrador side of the Straits of Belle Isle; this intelligence was brought to Curbing by the S. S. Ethie, this ship arriving here from the north on Thursday night. Captain English told the "Western Star" that from Bonne Esperance to Red Bay there was nothing doing in that line. Some crews at Henley have from one hundred to one hundred and fifty quintals cod on shore. At Blanc Sablon trapping is over, there is little doing with traps and hook and line; caplin scarce, and dogfish are plentiful on the grounds; Grant had 18,000 quintals cod up to 26th July. The Sagona was at Belle Isle on 5th August and reported no cod south of Ironbound Islands but good fishing north of there. On the Newfoundland side at the Straits people have apparently given up the fishery for the present, all seeming to have enough. There was a good sign of herring at Cape Charles and Chinn-Tickle when the Ethie was there.
