It was decided to take over the remainder of the building occupied by the Co-Operative Stores, for the Association to use for local and committee meetings. Twenty one applicants were admitted to membership, after which the meeting closed.

Note of Sympathy.

Much sympathy is expressed to Mrs. Lavinia Bussey, of Port de Grave, in the death of her son, Jacob Bussey, who lost his life in the discharge of duty on Oct. 3rd instant. Seaman Bussey who was a member of the Newfoundland Royal Naval Reserve, went down with his ship, which was sunk by either enemy submarine or mine. Both on land and sea, Newfoundlanders are proving their qualities, and unflinchingly meeting death.

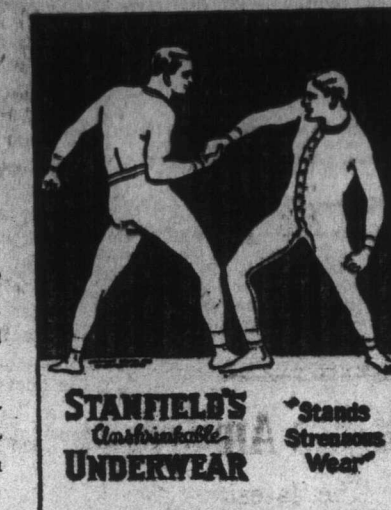
