The Best Explanation.

British merchants have regained their business since the end of the war in a way that has astonished the world, and many explanations have been offered for this marvelous revival. Some have ascribed it to British statesmanship, others have maintained that it is due to the business ability of British merchants, and again it has been asserted that the Free Trade policy should be given all the credit. The true explanation, however, was probably given by Colonel W. Grant Morgan when in the course of an address in Toronto the other day he said:

"Some people wonder how Britain is regaining its overseas trade. I assure you that one of the most important factors is that men know when they make a contract with a British firm, it will be respected and lived up to the last letter not only of the legal but the moral point of the law. I say to you, members of the Toronto Board of Trade, that if you follow those traditions of the merchants of England, you need never look back, that you will couple with that great tradition which they have established throughout the world, the fact that Canada is a part of the British Empire, and that a contract made within the British Empire is as good as the gold in the Bank of England."

The people who had gone out after that trade while Britain was engaged in the great struggle had repudiated their contracts when the prices of raw materials went up. It is only natural then that business returned to the "men of the covenant" at the end of the war. That principle is respected even by men who do not live up to it themselves. Even men who do not deal honestly with other people expect everybody else to give them a square deal and they always prefer buying from honest people. That honesty is an outstanding characteristic of the British race will not be questioned. Generally speaking, their word is as good as their bond. They attach their names either to business contracts or international agreements with the intention of carrying out all the provisions to the letter. That this principle appeals to the British race was proven in the war. Other nations entered the war either to defend their own territory or their commerce, to extend their borders or to "get square" with somebody. Most of them

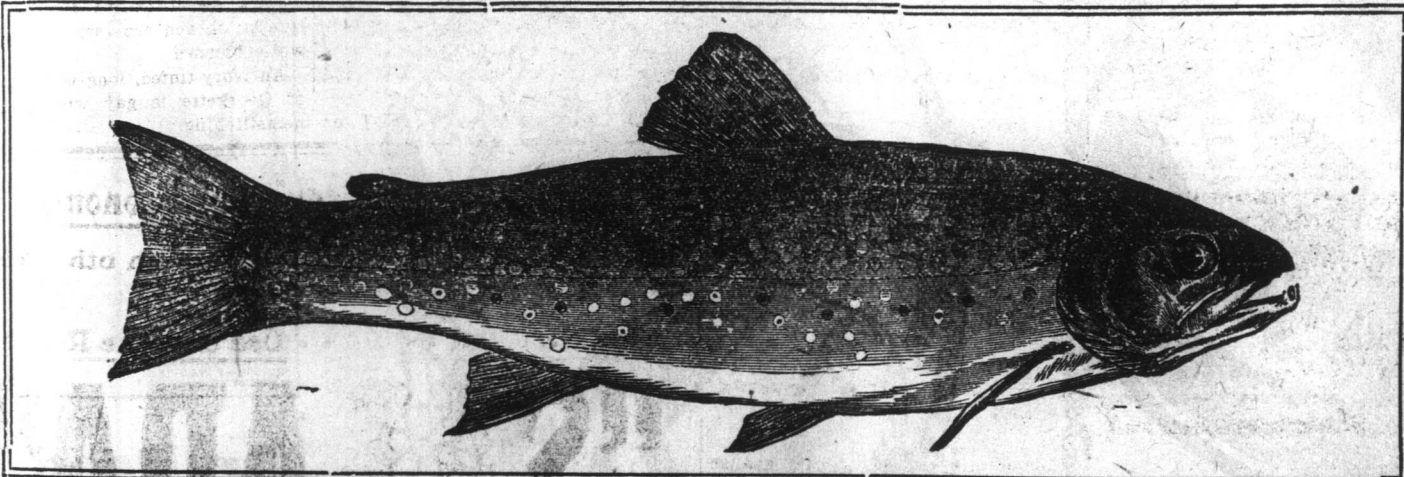
