FAMILY TRAGEDY.

JERSEY CITY, July 21. Mrs. Andrew Polski and three young children were burned to death while sleeping in their home yesterday.

LAI'D BY THE HEELS.

LOS ANGELES, July 21. Jack Johnson, wanted in Chicago for five years, for violation of the Anti-Slavery Law, is lodged in the county jail here, following his arrest yesterday.

NOT ENOUGH EVIDENTLY.

CHICAGO, July 21. Railway brotherhood officials, after an all day conference, made no attempt to conceal their disappointment over the \$600,000,000 award in the billion dollar wage increase fight. The belief is the award will be submitted without recommendation to a referendum of the men.

FEAR THE SHOCK.

DOORN, Holland, July 21. Physicians decide that the condition of the ex-Empress of Germany is such that it would be unwise to inform her of Prince Poachim's death.

A SOVIET DOCUMENT.

LONDON, July 21. The refusal of the Russian Soviet Government to cease war against Poland and at the request of Great Britain to contain in a Moscow wireless dispatch received here to-day. The refusal also constitutes an appeal to the workers and peasants of Soviet Russia and Ukraine, is signed by Commissioner of Justice Kuriski, and says "The British Government addressed a proposal to us on July eleven to cease war against Poland and begin peace negotiations with Poland and other states, promising that Polish troops, in case of an armistice being concluded, would retreat to a frontier marked last year by the Peace Conference. In the same note it was proposed that General Wrangel and his Crimean shelter should not be touched. To all of this we, the Council of Peoples' Commissioners, answered by a refusal. If England had not desired war, she would have stopped supplying Poland with munitions and money, and in carrying on negotiations with Poland as a concession to her working classes. Lord Curzon, British Foreign Secretary, blames it upon the League of Nations, in whose name he is willing to make a proposal, but Poland enters into the composition of this negotiation. Poland, who commenced robbery war against us. All members of the League, especially France, England and the United States are joined hand in hand in this provocative war of Poland against Russia and Ukraine. Our refusal of hostile mediation does not mean that we have altered our policy towards Poland. Moscow more than once has proposed peace to Warsaw, and if she will appeal to us directly, peaceful relations will be established between Russia and Poland, sooner, better and more substantially in this way."

QUEBEC, July 22. The parents of an 11 year old boy burglar were severely lectured and sent to jail yesterday for fifteen days.

A LARGE ESTATE.

VICTORIA, July 22. Hon. James Dunsmuir, late Lieut. Governor, left an estate valued at a million, intact, to his wife, according to will filed yesterday.

WOMEN SUFFRAGE.

COLOMBUS, Ohio, July 22. The first act of the Republican Legislative Committee, yesterday, was the unanimous adoption of a resolution urging Republican members of the Tennessee Legislature to vote for the ratification of the Federal women suffrage amendment.

A BIG PRICE.

WHITBY, Ont., July 22. Sir Frank Bailey Oakville, yesterday, paid five thousand two hundred dollars for the imported Scottish shorthorn "Countess Telma Fourth" with calf.

PRINTERS' WAGE INCREASE.

OTTAWA, July 22. The members of the Job Printers' Union, Ottawa, will receive minimum pay of thirty five dollars per week instead of thirty two. Award terms were handed to the Minister of Labor yesterday by Conciliation Board.

FIREMEN KILLED.

PHILADELPHIA, July 22. Two firemen were killed and ten others injured yesterday when an extension ladder broke during fire here.

INCREASE IN RAILROAD RATES.

WASHINGTON, July 22. Milk and passenger transportation in United States will bear substantial portions of the freight rate increase, to be asked by railroad of commerce commission. To offset six hundred million dollars additional yearly expense caused by Labor Boards wages award, it was announced yesterday.

How Battleships Are Named.

Argus was a mythical gentleman who was the possessor of a hundred eyes.

When the Admiralty wanted to find a name for a warship that was being commissioned to act as an aeroplane carrier, they chose Argus—for a ship carrying the eyes of the Fleet it would be impossible to find a more appropriate name.

Ark Royal is the name of another ship which sends out "doves" in the shape of aircraft. The Royal part of the name comes to us from the time of Good Queen Bess, when it was added to the "Ark" to show that the vessel was a capital, or as they called it in those days "Royal" ship.

Although there are no hard and fast rules laid down as to how our warships must be named, there are one or two broad lines to which the Board of Admiralty like to keep.

Reviving Famous Names.

When new capital ships—the big fighters, that is—are launched, they are given, if possible, names which have been borne in the past by other large men-o'-war. If the memory of some famous admiral has to be perpetuated, his name is given to a capital ship, but the name of a lesser officer—a captain, for instance—would be borne by a destroyer.

In this connection it is interesting to note that the first St. Vincent and Hawke were both small craft. It was not till much later that the great merit of these officers was fully appreciated and their names given to large ships. Now, their names are borne by battleships.

Some warships are named after big naval battles, and this commemorating of famous fights and famous fighters continually keeps an example before our sailors and encourages them to uphold the fine traditions of the service.

There has been a tendency of late to revive famous names which have been neglected, and perhaps the most noteworthy case of all is that of the Mary Rose.

The Mary Rose was a famous ship of the time of the Stuarts, but since that time the name has been allowed to drop. During the War it was revived, but the ship bearing it was sunk. Consequently there is no Mary Rose at present—but the name will never be forgotten again. As soon as an opportunity occurs, a ship will be christened by this name.

Small vessels, such as sweepers or minelayers, are as a rule given "class" names. One class of minelayers, for instance, would all be called after racehorses, so that any official receiving a communication concerning a ship called, say, "Tetratema" would immediately recognise it as a minelayer. One batch of sloops were named after flowers—and the flotilla was known by the nickname of "Herbaceous Border." Names That Might Make Mischief. A few destroyers were named after battles fought during the War. The Mons and Marne are examples, but it is a fact that these names were chosen more because they began with M than for any other reason! The "M" class were being built then, you see. In twenty or thirty years time the names will still be in use, but they will perhaps belong to mighty battleships instead of destroyers.

There is one curious point which some of our observant readers may have noticed. Although there are ships named after such towns as Southampton, Dartmouth and Glasgow, the very names one would expect to find are missing. There is no Portsmouth, Dover, Sheerness or Plymouth—all very much nautical towns. Strange as this may seem at first, there is very sound reason for it.

Suppose one ship was signalling to another, and the word "Portsmouth" was used. Confusion might arise as to whether the town or battleship was meant, and although the other parts of the message might give a clue, it was decided to be on the safe side and refrain from giving ships the names of ports which are much used by the Navy.

Some Simple Remedies.

Bruises are best treated in the first place by a poultice of vinegar and oatmeal.

Sprain pains are often relieved by applying a mixture made of (1) a little turpentine, (2) same amount of acetic acid, and (3) the white of an egg. Put in a bottle and shake up well.

Hiccough can be stopped by gargling a little vinegar into which a small quantity of treacle or syrup has been put.

Catarrah has been cured by sniffing ordinary table salt each morning, and afterwards washing out the mouth with a mixture of warm salt water.

A good poisoning emetic is salt and hot water.

Stings are best treated immediately. Apply a bluerag if handy about the house; otherwise, damp tobacco is a good substitute.

Rheumatism sufferers should remember that sugar is that complaint's best friend.

Corns may sometimes be cured with castor oil. This applies more especially to soft corns. Soak some wadding with the oil, place on the corn, before getting into bed, tying a
