Prussian Fishery Regulations.

Editor Evening Telegram

Dear Sir,—In asking you for the freedom of the press to publish my views as a fisherman, as to the Fishery Regulations, the fisheries and trade in general, you will not alone be doing me a favour but the country in general. In taking my pen to write up my views and experience I cut out politics, which some of the Government papers are trying to mix up with those Prussian Fishery Regulations, with which Coaker and others have done much to ruin the principal industry of Newfoundland—the fisheries. These regulations are causing unrest and will continue to do so, and are driving thousands of our younger fishermen from their native land to seek employment in the United States and Canada, as well as provoking much poverty and depression amongst the working classes, a great deal more than did the Bank Crash of 1894.

Touthing the activity along the water front, made so much of in the Government press last week, let me say that for the past twenty-five years St. John's never had less craft landing fish at this season, and this paucity of fish vessels is not caused by any shortage in this year's catch. There is quite a quantity of fish in Bay de Verde, Petty Harbor, Ferryland District, Trepassay, St. Mary's and Placentia. But, coming into St. John's by thousands of quintals is the cause of the notorious Fish Regulations, which are strangling the trade and ruining Newfoundland's chief industry. Did ever any one know of such depression as exists at present with so little labor offering and men wondering whether they shall turn next for a job. No less than the city fish merchants the outport suppliers feel the sting of the regulations and are dead in opposition to them, because they are crushing down into the dust merchant and fisherman alike. The principal firms in St. John's and the outports have ever been ready to assist the fishermen and never curtailed—until now—the issue of supplies. Has Mr. Coaker duplicated, or imitated even, their action?

Fishermen of the North, South and West should stand by the men who in the past helped them in the way of a comfortable living, and who are now fighting for liberty and free trade against regulations that would do no discredit to a Kaiser, but are a menace to the free rights of a free people.

Mr. Coaker's knowledge of the fisheries is very limited, and yet he professes to know more about them than men who have spent their whole life time in close connection with the whole process of catching, curing and making. His practical knowledge of the main industry of Newfoundland is so small that one page of a Royal Primer would contain it, yet what he does not know about it would fill more volumes than the Encyclopaedia Britannica contains.

Threatening the freedom of the press is a sure sign of autocracy at its worst, but the fishermen of Newfoundland will see to it that the press

will be allowed untrammelled rights and liberty to speak in defence of the people.

The prime question to-day is not politics, but bread and butter to us fishermen and our families as well as to the working classes, who are hampered and kept down by lack of employment. The talk of Coaker's Advocate is all bluff and nonsense. Everything appearing in that delectable sheet must have the approval of the big chief and his word is law, so fishermen will not allow themselves to be made believe that everything is rosy and that Mr. Coaker is the sole champion of their rights.

The prohibition placed upon United States buyers of fish is surely the limit, considering the position in which we are in and our relations with the great Republic of the West. Discrimination such as is proposed will have a most disastrous effect on the dominion. It is frightening off prospective fish purchasers from the dominion. It is frightening off the buyers that can be had. Their presence will establish keen rivalry and competition and the price of fish will be enhanced.

There is such a law as that of retaliation and the measures of Mr. Coaker are placing us in that position where retaliatory action may be expected. This would not be to our advantage, so fishermen and fellow-countrymen, I have taken up the pen in this fight for the individual freedom of every man in Newfoundland against Prussianism and all relating to such. Will you hearken to my advice or will you follow the lead to destruction—given by these Fish Regulations? The answer and the act is with yourselves.

Business at Halifax.

Fish Prices Lower Than Last Year. (F. A. Carman, in Montreal Daily Star.)

Halifax, Sept. 23.—The business men of Nova Scotia are facing the future with confidence, but they admit readily enough that the process of readjustment and reconstruction has reached the province. Prices in some lines have already begun to fall and there has been some curtailment of credit. The labor market, though it has some weak spots, is generally steady. The war wave of purchasing has fallen off, but this is not regarded as an unlooked evil. The process of readjustment has so far been very gradual, and though caution is being preached, financiers and business men are looking to a return to an era of lower prices with hopefulness and without panic.

Halifax is in some respects the business and financial centre of the three Maritime Provinces. Two at least of the chartered banks have in Halifax officers, called "superintendents," who have general oversight of the situation for their respective banks throughout the three provinces. The acting supervisor for the Royal Bank

of Canada is Mr. F. St. C. Harris, who was formerly manager for the same bank in Halifax. Mr. Harris discussed the present financial situation in these provinces in a spirit that was at once optimistic and cautious.

A Good Outlook.

"The situation down here," said Mr. Harris, "does not differ materially from that existing in other parts of Canada. There is a strong demand for money and loans are being considerably restricted but the policy of the banks generally is to provide funds to finance productive industries and other legitimate business enterprises, and up to the present time these classes of business have been well provided for."

"The condition of the lumber market is not all that could be desired. In recent months there has been considerable falling off in this trade in England. Stocks on that side have been accumulating and there are not many buyers in the field at the high prices which have prevailed for some time in the past. Under these conditions it is quite possible that some of the largest producers of lumber in these provinces will not operate during the coming season, at least not to the extent of last year, which

was a record with many of them. "The general outlook for the Maritime Provinces is for a prosperous fall. There is a good apple crop in the Annapolis valley. While the yield will probably be from sixty to seventy-five per cent. of 1919, indications are that the fruit is of much better quality and good prices are looked for. However, the present low rate of sterling is going to work quite a disadvantage to shippers of both lumber and apples to the English market. This season does not promise to be as good a one for fish as last and buyers are very cautious and prices offered are much lower than 1919. Taking everything into consideration there is the prospect of a distribution of a large volume of money in payment for our natural products and with this the prospect of reasonably good business conditions."
