WEEKLY MEETING.

The City Council held its regular meeting yesterday afternoon. Mayor Cook presiding and Councillors Martin, Outerbridge, Collier, Ryan and Dowden being present.

After the minutes of previous meetings were read and confirmed, a deputation from the unemployed, consisting of Messrs. Bennett, Viscount and Hannaford, were admitted to the Council Chamber. During the week they requested an interview with the Council, to place before them certain matters in connection with the present labour depression.

Mr. Bennett, on behalf of the Deputation, in a lengthy address referred to the hardships to which many skilled and unskilled labourers and mechanics were subjected owing to lack of employment, and asked if the Council had in anticipation the opening up of works whereby ready employment could be obtained. He said he had been informed the Government advanced the Council, by way of guaranteed loan, the sum of \$20,000 for purpose of relaying water pipe line and to relieve the situation. The Mayor replied that the Council had asked the Government for this amount and the request had been acceded to, but he expressed regret that the deputation the fact that this loan was obtained for a most urgent and specific purpose, that of protecting the city water supply by relaying the old water main, which was corroded for a distance of some 1,900 feet that it would be mainly used in the purchase of heavy pipes and materials and that the work itself had been placed to contract, and at best would give employment to only thirty men for about three or four weeks.

Following this, Mr. Bennett again referred to a loan of \$100,000.00 which he stated, the Government was prepared to give the Council to relieve the depression, and in reply was informed that the Council had not as yet been approached on this matter, and furthermore would not be in a position to take any loans other than those for works which are absolutely necessary; also that the Government had been asked for certain moneys for the erection of new sanitary stables, repairs to the dam at Gill Pond, Windsor Lake, and payment for land taken during the relief works, 1921 (for which demands are being made by the owners); that all such loans would be a liability on the city and interest of 6 and 6 1/2 per cent. had to be paid out of the current Revenue, and as the present interest on City Debt was somewhere in the vicinity of \$100,000.00 per annum, the Council could not, in justice to the taxpayers, further increase the taxes to pay interest on loans other than already provided for.

The Mayor, whilst sympathizing with the men in their endeavours to find some means of relief, plainly put the position of the Council before them, and made clear its financial inability to undertake works which would mean heavy expenditure.

The Deputation thanked the Council for the hearing given them, and retired.

The following matters were then taken up:—

Communication from Chairman Johnson of the Dickson Memorial Committee, with regard to the lights recently imported for the monument. The Engineer will supply the necessary information as to location.

Mr. C. Lynch asked reasons why services had been dispensed with in connection with the pump, Battery Road. The Council recently placed a new, up to date pump there for the benefit of the residents, and the same attention is not needed as in the past.

Applications were read from the Bandmasters of the C.C.C., C.L.B. and Mr. Cashel Bands, asking permission to hold concerts in Bannerman and Victoria Parks during the coming season. In this connection there has been some dissatisfaction amongst citizens owing to the Parks being used every night for the concerts, and it was thought that if two concerts weekly in each park could be arranged, the applications might be granted. The matter was therefore referred to the Bannerman and Victoria Committees for their consideration.

Mr. F. B. Williams drew attention to the fact that motorists were in the habit of using that very congested thoroughfare, Casey Street, in order to reach the Higher Levels, and he considered this was most dangerous owing to the many children playing in the street daily, and should not be permitted, as serious accidents were likely to occur. A copy of his communication will be forwarded the Inspector General, for an opinion as to the advisability of closing this street to motorists.

Mr. E. S. Baggs, Allendale Road, asked why the Sanitary Department did not call in this as in other sections of the city for collection of garbage. This was referred to the Sanitary Supervisor.

Tender of Messrs. Wm. Heap and Company for supply of cast iron pipe was accepted.

Reports of the City Engineer, Sanitary Supervisor, and other departmental heads were tabled; requisitions acceded to, and an order given for the payment of accounts submitted.

The meeting then adjourned.

Ranger Towed Seal to Lord's Cove

HEAVY ICE CONDITIONS REPORTED.

The Department of Shipping received a message from Capt. A. Kean of the Ranger yesterday afternoon, advising them that she got to the assistance of the Seal on the previous evening. Owing to the heavy ice conditions which were met with, towing did not commence until daylight yesterday. Two hawsers were attached and the disabled ship was towed after much difficulty to Lord's Cove, which is near Snug Harbor, when an anchor was dropped at 3.30 a.m. The Ranger returned south to call a Battle Harbor and other point which she missed when going to the Seal's assistance. Capt. Jacob Kean also wired in last night, stating the 275 passengers were on the ship. Arrangements have been made by the Coastal Department to transfer these to the Ranger and Sagana for passage to their destination.

Pearls of Great Price.

Most persons have placed the lustre white pearl above all others. The Chinese, however, together with other eastern peoples, prefer the yellow pearl, believing that it preserves both luster and color longer than the white.

This pearl is said to owe its yellow to the fact that the oysters have been allowed to die and putrify in their shells, the shells opening themselves on the death of the oyster.

This custom has been ascribed to the fact that the pearl generally lies close to the edge of the shell, and it is feared that many fine pearls would be spoiled if the process of opening the shell with a knife were practiced.

Black pearls are very much valued. The famous necklace of black pearls belonging to the late Empress Eugenie was sold for \$25,000.

Pink pearls are much desired among the Buddhists, who employ them profusely in the adorning of their temples. The inhabitants of Chipmunk are said to place a pink pearl in the mouth of a dead relative or friend before cremation of the body.
