



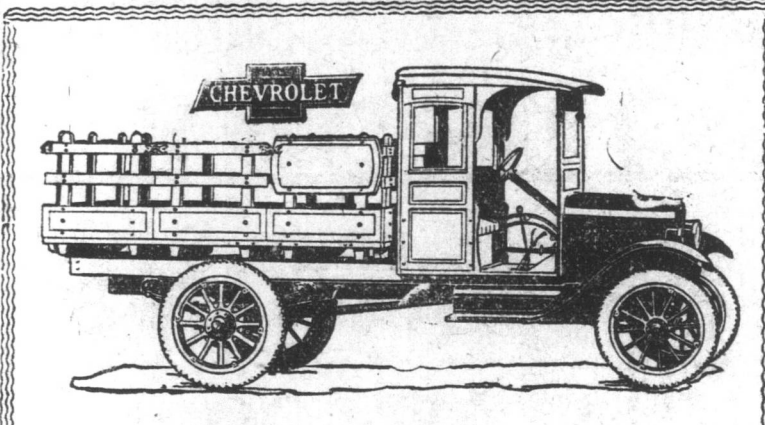

Forty-Six Years in the Service of the Public—The Evening Telegram.

House of Assembly Proceedings
FRIDAY, March 27.
The House met at 8 p.m.

PETITIONS.
MR. POWER presented a petition from Grand and Little Rivers on the subject of a road.
HON. J. J. LONG on behalf of the member for Burgeo presented a petition from Cal-de-Sac respecting the coastal service.
THE COLONIAL SECRETARY tabled the Report of the Government Savings Bank.

THE MINISTER OF AGRICULTURE AND MINES introduced a Bill "An Act respecting the Records of Pure Bred Animals," which was read a first time and ordered to be read a second time to-day.

ANSWERS TO QUESTIONS.
In answer to Mr. Hickman the MINISTER OF PUBLIC WORKS stated that no man by the name of Baggs belonging to Harbor Grace District was under salary by the Government.
On the second reading of the Council's Amendments to the "Light Dues Bill," the MINISTER OF FINANCE AND CUSTOMS briefly explained that they permitted a voyage to Canada of vessels without paying the customary 24 cents charge. The amendments were accordingly read and sent back to the Council, advising them of the concurrence of the House.
On the second reading of the "Highways Bill" the COLONIAL SECRETARY explained the amendments, which were many.
MR. WARREN objected to the twelfth amendment, which provided that the minimum penalty for any infraction of the Act be five dollars fine or ten days. He felt the legislation was too drastic, and did away with the discretion of the magistrates. He strenuously objected to it.

THE ATTORNEY GENERAL concurred that, whereas the sections laying down the penalties for the really grave offences, left a vast discretion to the magistrates, this left them with no discretion for any offence not specifically set forth. He agreed with the Hon. member for Fortune, and he suggested that the words "not less than five dollars" and "not less than ten days" be struck out.

The amendments passed except No. 12, which was amended by striking out the objectionable minimum penalty.
The Bills relating to the Dry Dock and Encouragement of Shipbuilding were passed, and ordered sent to the Legislature for concurrence.
The House went into Committee of the Whole on Supply. Before proceeding MR. HICKMAN asked to have his questions in relation to the railroad personnel answered.
THE PRIME MINISTER replied that the matter of answering the questions was being considered by the Government and Railway Commission. Manager Russell had informed him that the Canadian Minister of Railways refused to give similar information to the Legislature.
MR. WARREN brought up some matters in connection with Loans and the price of Bonds, and a short discussion ensued. When the votes in the Estimates were taken up the question of pensions was raised.

THE MINISTER OF FINANCE said this matter was receiving the attention of the Government. He informed the House that there were pensioners who gave not more than nine months' service, and it is now being considered if a more equitable scheme could not be devised.
On the vote for the House of Assembly several members took occasion to land the quality of the work being done this year by the reporting staff of the House.
MR. BROWNE (St. John's West) referred to the inadequate Library at the disposal of the Legislature. He had sent repeatedly for works of reference only to find that they were not available. He thought the House ought to subscribe to various publications which would be useful for reference and helpful in connection with legislation. He also referred to the worth of the services of the Librarian, Miss Morris.

MR. C. J. CAHILL gave his support to the suggestion. Considerable progress was made with the Estimates when the Committee rose at 6:15 p.m. The House then went into Committee of the Whole on the Textile Resolutions.
THE PRIME MINISTER explained the alteration which had been made in the agreement since it was first before the House.
MR. WARREN repeated his previous argument as to what answer the Government would have if the clothing factories asked for similar concessions, and added that the twenty year period of protection was too lengthy.
MR. GRIMES asked for some information re the class of goods that would be manufactured.
MR. SCAMMELL expressed his approval of the Bill as it was for the encouragement of a local industry. Some further discussion took place and the Prime Minister rose the Committee in order to ascertain more particulars about the material designated cotton webbing, because if it were the fabric of a garment very little work would be given in making

it up, and thus the intention of the resolution would be defeated. The agreement reads:—

"1. The following articles when imported by the Company for use, in connection with the manufacturing of woollen and cotton knitted garments shall, for a period of twenty years from the first day of January, A.D. 1925, be admitted into the Colony free of duty, that is to say:—

- (a) All material and machinery required for and entering into the original construction and finishing and the further extension of the Company's factory or plant, but not for the replacement or substitution of new for old.
- (b) Flannellets, cotton, fleecy cotton webbing, facings, threads, woollen and cotton yarns dyed or undyed, wool oils, buttons, elastics, tapes, labels, soda ash, bleaching and dyeing materials, and wrapping materials.

2. This agreement is subject to confirmation and approval by the Legislature of Newfoundland. The remaining orders of the day were deferred.

THE SPEAKER appointed the Speaker, Messrs. Browne, Cahill, Grimes and Ashbourne to serve as the Library Committee for the session. The House then adjourned until Monday.

Sent in three horses for treatment for lameness; one that I had sent in some time ago perished this week. I sent in one other horse with a very bad back. I told the owner to have the veterinary surgeon treat the horse, and not to work it until it was fit. He received a report of a wounded dog, on the old railway track. The dog, with some others, was the cause of much annoyance to a resident of Pennywell Road. He fired at the dog but only wounded it. The dog ran away and he could not find it. I received a report of the same and I made a search around Freshwater and the old railway track and found it eventually in a swamp. I then humanely destroyed it. I also humanely destroyed several domestic animals. The owner of the horse and cart complained of in the East-End has promised to do better and has also promised to get a new cart. I will be very happy to furnish any persons, wishing to become members of the Society, with Membership Tickets. Anyone wishing to buy a "Horse's Prayer" picture, may have one for the small cost of 50 cents (unframed), and \$2.50 (framed). I also attended the landing of 24 head of choice butchers cattle for the St. John's Abattoir Company. The cattle were in splendid condition and were very carefully handled. Also attended the landing of 6 horses for Mr. P. Summers, which were given every attention while on board the S.S. Sable Island, and while they were being landed.
