I make no apology for quoting thus lengthily on the investigation held by us into the Department, for I consider it desirable to acquaint Honourable members of the condition into which physically, morally and from a financial point of view past administrations had permitted this Department to fall. I fear the question of Post and Telegraph work has not been given that serious atttention which such an important Department re-

I understand from the Auditor General, who was associated with myself and the Minister of Posts and Telegraphs in the conduct of the encurry, that his Department had no uthority in respect of the taking of stocks or other internal audit and that the matter of inspection of outport offices was one which was so colossal in its survey that with the small staff at his command it could not be attempted.

As a result of this want of inspection of outport offices, I decided to have a personal inspection last fall. the result of which revealed an utter want of method in the accounting system with regard to the offices visted. There was never a complete audit of these offices taken, so that any Postmaster handling Money Order, Telegraph, Customs and Stamp cash in the one office (and most of them do) might very easily cover a shortage in cash on Money Order by cash from any of the other accounts, and the same thing applied as far as the other accounts were concerned. In other words, there was no concurrent effort on the part of the several inspectors of the Service; the Customs' Inspector simply inspected the Customs; the Money Order Inspector, the Money Orders; the Telegraphs, thte Telegraphs and so on. Of course it will be evident to Honourable members that an audit inpection of this kind was useless inofar as the cash check of any comned office in the outports could be
