Britain Deports Nine Communists

NEW LAWS MAY BE SOUGHT TO DEAL WITH THE MENACE.

LONDON, Oct. 22.-(U. N.)-Nine Communsits are waiting aboard a Russian steamer at Southampton to be transported to Moscow, the Government is moving against native Communist agitators with all the power of existing laws and preparations have been made to ask Parliament for further power to suppress Communism if the present laws prove inadequate.

What the Conservative Government wants is power to crush 'British Communism completely and finally. If a test of the present laws proves that more power is needed the Parliament convening Nov. 16 will be asked to act. The test of the law already is in hand in connection with the trials of eight native Communists arrested when the campaign against

sedition began last week.
Two more Communists were arrested, Wednesday, Arthur McManus and J. T. Murphy, the latter a member of the executive committee of the British Communist Party. McManus' name appeared as a signatory to the "Zinovieff letter" of last autumn, whose circulation in England contributed to the defeat of the Labor Party

at the general election Against foreign agitators the Government already possesses an adequate weapon-deportation. The will to use it is indicated in the presence of the alien agitators at the South-

ampton docks. The Government's campaign has inpeded for months, but it has just been learned that the reason is was delayed so long was that police officials had insisted that the present laws were not suitable for prosecution for sedition unless the agitator urged physical violence against a particular person.

The revelation is interesting in view of the disastrous defeat of Ran. say MacDonald's Government last November. One of the two issues upon which MacDonald fell was the fact his Cabinet had ordered the surpression of prosecution against Communist agitator, John Compbeli. The Laborite defense was that the evidence against Campbell was not sufficient to make prosecution worth while. The Conservatives laughed at the explanation, but now a Conservatives laughed at the explanation, but now a Conservative Government may have to ask further laws to do just what was demanded of the Labor Government.
