Hon. Mr. Blake Elected by Acclamation !

The nomination of the Hon. Mr. Blake for South Bruce took place at Walkerton on Thursday the 4th. After the formal portion of the proceedings had been disposed of, Mr. Malcolm McPherson, of Kincardine, moved, and Mr. Alex. Gibson, of Teeswater, seconded the nomination of Mr. Blake. As it was evident that no more nominations would be made, it was suggested that an adjournment to the Court House should be made. The returning-officer and one or; two the gentlemen remained upon the hustings until the expiration of the hour, when the returning-officer declared Mr. Blake elected by acclamation, which announcement was received with the utmost satisfaction. The meeting was organized in the Court House by the appointment of Mr. H. B. O'Connor to the chair. Mr. Blake, after thanking the electors of South Bruce for the honour they had conferred on him, proceeded to speak of the necessity of a sound election law which would give reasonable security for the purity of our elections, and exposed the conduct of the late Government in refusing to pass an election law one session and bringing a similar one forward duct of the late Government in rous-ing to pass an election law one sess-ion and bringing a similar one forward the next session. Their conduct in this respect he considered wholly un-justifiable. He then glanced at the means by which the late Government obtained an undue influence over the justifiable. He then glanced at the means by which the late Government oltained an undue influence over the electors, and spoke of the magnitude of the contract for the Pacific Railway and of the extraordinary powers given to the Macdonald Government in respect to it. The conferring of these powers he regarded as a flagrant outrage upon the people's rights. In alluding to the circumstances which induced him to accept a seat in the Cabinet, he said he had received a requisition signed by one hundred and nineteen members. He was of opinion that the business of the country would be best carried on by persons in receipt of salaries adequate to the labours performed. There was a difference in regard to the labours of the different offices, and in his judgment there should be a corresponding difference in the salaries. He himself was not disposed to accept an office the duties of which were light, and accept as salary equal to those received by the gentlemen in the more arduous departments. He justified by precedent the constitutionality of his action in this respect, namely, that of accepting a seat in the Cabinet without porfolio, and showed in what respect he was responsible as a member of the Privy Council. After drawing a comparison between the present Government and the late one, he said that the alternation of parties was for the best interests of the country, and was satisfied that no party would again continue in power for twenty years. The existing Government had a reasonable hope of obtaining the earnest support of the country, and of remaining in office for some time. They would not, however, sit there any longer than they enjoyed the confidence of the country, for they considered there was nothing more discreditable than to attempt to retain office simply for the sake of power.
