"Sir Percy berated the crestfallen inventor as a humbug, and the inventor left in high temper. Soon German interests had signed up the output of the entire mines. I had not failed my Kaiser.

There are those who are not inclin ed to believe this account of the man ner in which the Germans obtained their amazing hold on the Australian metal industry. But the fact remains that the Germans did get this mono poly; and that the German countess on the admission of federal ministers was one of the most successful and dangerous German spies who visited Australia in pre-war days.

If the final count in the Australian referendum results in a defeat for conscription it must be remembered that the Commonwealth, with a population smaller than Canada's, has sent a larger army to the war, and that its remoteness has prevented it from reaping the financial harvest which has come to this Dominion through war orders. If the soldier vote fails to overcome the civilian majority against compulsion the reverse must be largely attributable to the Social-ists, the I.W.W.'s, and Pacifists and the Mannixites or Sinn Feiners. According to the Melbourne Argus, the Socialists and the I.W.W.'s may be classed together, because they have one common idea. They acknowledge allegiance to no country.


