TORONTO, Ont., Aug. 3—11 p.m.—The

The Columbus Monument.

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—Chevalier Carlo

Barsotti, president of the executive com

mittee for the monument to Christopher

Columbus, yesterday received a letter from

some of the artists who formed the royal

commission for the judgment of the

monument. They say that the monument

is finished and was examined by them in

Rome on July 15, and that it is superior to all

expectations, really imposing in its immen

se structure and marvelous for the fitness of

the statues and bas-reliefs. The report

closes with this phrase: "This monument

will show to the strong and free and en

ergetic American people how grand the

concepts of the Italian art is, and that it is

impossible to reproduce better and with

more majesty the image of the man

who gave to civilization this great

Who Are the Jingoists?

Rev. A. C. Courtice (formerly of this

city), in the Dominion Square Methodist

Church, on Sunday evening, in
