The Parrot-Mouthed refused the second jump and unseated his rider, and every other horse fell at some part of the journey. Foolhardy and Nestor were remounted by outside boys, and finished in the time limit, getting the place and third respectively. Raymond, who rode Foolhardy, and T. Donohue, who rode Nestor, were both badly hurt. The former was carried insensible to the hospital with concussion of the brain, and the latter had his shoulder dislocated. THREE-PENNY TELEGRAMS. London, Oct. 12.—It is reported that the feasibility of introducing three-penny telegrams.

HOMICIDE BY IMPRUDENCE. Paris, Oct. 12.—The government prosecuting officers have been ordered to bring a charge of "homicide by imprudence" against the organizers of last Sunday's bullfight at Englebert-Bains. During the exhibition rebeles will afford immediate relief and were trampled upon.

LILY'S LIPS SEALED. London, Oct. 12.—A sensation was caused by Mrs. Langtry's sudden decision to suppress the publication of her reminiscences, which were expected to be issued about Christmas. One publisher had offered her \$100,000 for the book and also \$100,000 for the American rights.

GERMANY'S ATTITUDE. The Frankfurter Zeitung, in a semi-official article, contradicts the statements that efforts are being made to secure the intervention of the powers in the Transvaal. Germany, it says, will await developments inactively, if not un sympathetically.

THE ALASKAN BOUNDARY. Sir Louis Davies, Canadian minister of fisheries and marine, will confer again today regarding the Alaskan question with the secretary of state for the colonies, Mr. Joseph Chamberlain. Sir Louis has informed the Associated Press that the temporary line upon which it is expected an agreement will be reached will be a mere tentative measure for the preventing of local friction while the negotiations on the main question are in progress. He will sail for home in about a fortnight.

PANIC ON THE ITALIAN BOURSE. London, Oct. 12.—The position of the Italian bourse, which has been serious for some time, says a special dispatch from Rome, resulted in a veritable crash today. Several banks and large firms are in a serious condition. The losses are estimated at some hundreds of millions of lire.

REFORM FOR FRANCE. A special cable from Paris says: The cabinet today voted to place all French colonies under civil authority, and to abolish all military administration. The reform was proposed by M. De Crais, minister of the colonies, and is the direct outgrowth of the stories of cruelty and oppression of the natives by military authorities.

BARON FARRAR DEAD. London, Oct. 12.—Baron Thomas Farrar of Abinger Hall, one of the most distinguished British authorities on trade and coal mining, and is the permanent secretary of the board of trade, died suddenly this morning in his 81st year.

MICHIGAN CROPS.

Lansing, Mich., Oct. 12.—The report of Secretary of State Stearns for October says: This year's wheat crop is estimated at 12,000,000 bushels for the entire state. The total number of acres of wheat on the ground last April, as returned by the supervisors, was 1,914,941, and according to reports received 77 per cent of these acres were harvested. The final estimated yield for the state per acre is only eight bushels. The estimated yield of oats per acre is 32 bushels; corn, 31; potatoes, 68, and beans, 12. Buckwheat averages 11 bushels per acre.
