Driving Out The Marauders

British Forces Reoccupy Numerous Points of Vantage

That Had Been Taken by Bands of Boers—Dewet's Men Demoralized—British Militia Regiments To Be Disbanded—50,000 Men Affected.

Bloemfontein, Oct. 10.—The British forces have reoccupied Smithfield, Rouxville, Wepener and Dewetsdorp, Orange River Colony.

London, Oct. 10.—A dispatch from Pietermaritzburg, Natal, says it is officially announced that Gen. Buller will arrive there on Oct. 15. It is assumed from this that he is coming home.

FIFTY THOUSAND MEN ARE AFFECTED.
The British war office has issued orders that the bulk of the militia regiments called out for service during the South African war are to be disbanded. This will affect about 50,000 men.

ENEMY DEMORIALIZED.
London, Oct. 10.—The Times publishes the following dispatch from Vrededorp, Orange River Colony: "The British column had a three days' fight, from Oct. 5 to Oct. 7, including, with Gen. Dewet's command of 1,000 men and five guns. It took place in a veritable sea of mountains near here. The Boers were dislodged and dispersed, and they fled demoralized. The British casualties were slight."

BOERS SUFFER HEAVY LOSS.
Vryburg, Oct. 10.—Gen. Smit, with a force of 7,000 men, has relieved the garrison of Schweizer Reneke, after an engagement in which the Boers suffered heavy loss. The Boer commandant was captured.

Schweizer Reneke, 35 miles southeast of Vryburg, on the Harts River, was held by a tiny British garrison, which was surrounded by the Boers early in September. On Sept. 17 Lord Roberts reported that the defenders had strongly entrenched themselves, and having sufficient food, were in no danger of surrender so long as the provisions lasted. A relieving force was however, organized, comprising Paget's Horse, Cape Mounted Rifles and Diamond Fields Horse and Scouts.

REFUGEES.
Lorenzo Marquez, Oct. 9.—Hundreds of Boers, with their families, are fleeing to begin life again in some other country. Most have America as their ultimate destination. The refugees are French and German ships, and are willing to pay for the best accommodations. Special trains are engaged to meet the ships at Marseilles and carry them through France to Holland, their place of refuge. The refugees are only a temporary asylum. The name America is on every lip. Two German ships left here last week carrying 1,200 Boers. They were followed by two French ships, with 500 souls from the Transvaal, mostly women and children. All of these belonged to the better class of Boers, and all were bound for Holland. They do not say where they will go afterward. "To America" is the question asked of those who are left behind. "Probably," is the invariable answer.

The Canadians.

DANGEROUSLY WOUNDED.
Ottawa, Oct. 9.—A cable was received today from Cape Town stating that 143, McCarthy, Canadian Mounted Infantry, was dangerously wounded at Belfast on Oct. 4.

Private McCarthy belonged to the G. G. B. G. Toronto.

Toronto, Oct. 10.—The P. McCarthy, of the Canadian Mounted Rifles, reported dangerously wounded, was killed on Oct. 4, is Col. Denison says. Plantagenet McCarthy, son of Hamilton McCarthy, the well-known Canadian sculptor. He is only 19 years of age.

President Mitchell and His Party Have Gone to Scranton—A Great Demonstration.

Pottsville, Pa., Oct. 10.—There was a clash this morning between strikers and non-striking at the Oxco Bros. & Company's colliery at Onondaga, Schuyl County. The strikers gathered in large numbers near the colliery and endeavored to persuade men on their way to work to return to their homes. When they refused, a fight ensued, and both sides used sticks and stones freely, with the result that several were injured. The fight two shots were fired. The officials of the mine telephoned to Sheriff Toole asking for protection for their men to work.

GREAT DEMONSTRATION.
Scranton, Pa., Oct. 10.—All interest in the strike of the mine workers of the Lackawanna region today centered in the great parade and mass meeting arranged for this afternoon. President John Mitchell and his party reached here this morning.
