Continues To Be a Matter of Dispute.

Another Disaster on the Same Road Narrowly Averted by a Brakeman.

Detroit, Dec. 1 .- The only development yesterday in the matter of the big wreck on the Wabash at Seneca Wednesday evening was a statement sent out by the Associated Press from President Ramsey, of the Wapash, in which that official insists that the reports giving the number of dead and injured are exaggerated. There are several discrepancies, however, in the facts as he quotes them in the statement, besides which he throws absolutely no light on the question of what has become of the numerous Italians who, according to the rail-road officials' claims, made their es-cape after the crash. San Francisco, Nov. 30 .- The ferry boats Sausalito and San Rafael collided tonight in a dense fog, and the fifteen minutes. It is thought that not more than 30 passengers were drowned, although the San Rafael carried between 150 and 200 passengers. The Sausalito was not seriously injured. The San Rafael left San Francisco

at 6:15 with between 150 and 200 passengers. There was a dense fog on the bay. Capt McKenzie, of the San Rafael sent his boat along under a slow bell. He was somewhere near Alcatraz Island, when the Sausalito coming from Sausalito to San Francisco, crashed into her. There were but few passengers on the Sausalito, but they were badly frightened, and for a few minutes it looked as if both ships were going down. When it was seen that the Sausalito was not badly injured she stood by the San Rafael and officers, crew and passengers engaged in the rescue of the unfortunate passengers of the sinking vessel. 
