A NEW FORCE ORGANIZED

The Artillery Mounted Rifles Take the Field.

Reported Treachery of Boers in Shooting Two Officers Denied.

Three Officers and Two Troopers of the Canadian Mounted Infantry Thrown From Their Horses.

Johannesburg, Jan. 7 .- Lord Kitchener has organized a new mounted force from the artillery. This command, which will be known as the Artillery Mounted Rifles, took the field yesterday 1,400 strong. It consists chiefly of gunners of the howitzer batteries with some others from the field batteries. The reduced forces of the Boers offer little scope for artillerymen and it is believed that they can be used with greater effect as a mobile column to crush out the final resistance of the burghers.

LAND SETTLEMENT SCHEME. Bloemfontein, Jan. 7.-The government is purchasing 80,000 morgen of land in the Fickburg district in connection with the land settlement scheme. It has already bought 35,000 morgen in the Thaba N'Chu district. The idea is to split the lands into small holdings, and enable settlers to establish small communities and villages. The government is also buying large tracts of land for the same purpose in the conquered territory. Eighty farms have already been allotted, and there are numerous applications for

A NEW RAILWAY.

The Harrismith Bethlehem Railway, 70 miles long will shortly be completed. For 40 miles the line runs over breastworks that were constructed by the Boers before the war. Passenger traffic on the Bloemfontein-Sannas Post Railway, which hitherto has been used exclusively by the military, will commence tomorrow. The main line from Norval's Pont to Viljoen's Drift will be relaid immediately to provide for the extra heavy traffic.

A DENIAL. London, Jan. 7.-The war office on the authority of Lord Kitchener, denies the report telegraphed from Pretoria, January 1, that two officers of the intelligence department who were sent to parley with the Boers who desired to surender, near Warm Baths, were treacherously shot by concealed

CASUALTIES AT HALIFAX. Halifax, Jan. 7.-Several officers and men of the Second Canadian Mounted Rifles were thrown from their horses on the exhibition grounds, and two of them received s injuries. Lieut. Woodside, of Dawson City, who was the Canadian census commissioner in the Yukon, thrown from his horse and had his skull fractured. He is at the military hospital, and fears are entertained for his recovery. Lieut. Richards, formerly of Strathcona's Horse, and Lieut. Lamkin, of Quebec, were also thrown from their horses both receiving slight injuries. Trooper McLennan, of Kingston, Ont., was thrown violently from his horse, and his skull was fractured. The doctors hold out little hopes for his recovery. Trooper Mayne was hurled from his horse and had an arm broken. Several others received injuries.

CLOSE CALLS. Brampton, Ont., Jan. 7. - Saturday evening, as the two sons of Thomas Robinson, the eldest 10, the other 3 or 4 years of age, were driving a horse across the G. T. R. tracks at Queen street, the 4:50 express from Toronto struck the animal, killing it instantly. The two children escaped unhurt.
