ALL DENOMINATIONS SPEAK HIGHLY OF ST. ANDREW'S

Congregational Union in Connection With the Anniversary.

The Bishop of Huron Expressed Some Worthy Thoughts

Methodists, Baptists, Congregationalists, All Say Kind Things of the Grand Old Church.

No better evidence of the growing fellowship between the various Protestant denominations could be found than the appearance last night in St. Andrew's Church, of representatives of the Anglican, Methodist, Baptist, Congregational and Presbyterian bodies. It was the "Congregational Reunion" in connection with the anniversary of St. Andrew's Church, and there was a fair attendance of members of the congregation. The meeting was presided over by Mr. C. R. Somerville, and a feature of the evening was the special music rendered by the choir, assisted by Miss Eva Robyn, soprano soloist.

The chairman, in opening, referred to the unavoidable and regrettable absence of Rev. Dr. Johnston, speaking of the 90 years since their first church was built he said that two members of St. Andrew's congregation today remembered the building of that church 90 years ago.

Mr. James Gillean, who went on to show that the church had had three pastors, the first, Rev. Dr. Scott, having had charge for 25 years, and the second, Rev. Dr. Gordon, for 15 years.

HEARTY CONGRATULATIONS.

Rev. Dr. McCrae, moderator of the Presbytery of London, said that the present from other churches, and how a union of love and sympathy was better than any physical union.
