We affirm our conviction that while the work of the education of the public conscience and moral suasion with the individual must be emphasized, yet it is the duty of a Christian public to seek such legislation on the part of the state as shall secure the total abolition of a traffic so evil in its character and its results; we therefore urge upon the members congregations to seek, by all righteous means, the ultimate suppression of the traffic in strong drink. And in this connection we commend to all to whom our recommendation comes, the importance of making moral issues supreme in matters political and civic. Rev. Dr. Johnston stated that in the stand he took in pressing the matter referred to in the resolution before the synod, he was moved by the dictates of conscience. So far as he could see there was no possibility of interpreting the present resolution as favoring any political party.
