THE BIBLE SHOULD BE READ IN ALL THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Presbyterian Synod Recommends It as Literature.

Gathering Could Not Agree on the Subject of Prohibition.

Minority Report of the Committee on Temperance Reform Is Finally Adopted.

After disposing of routine business yesterday afternoon in connection with the Synod of Hamilton and London, the following resolutions of the committee of the synod on the Bible as literature in our schools, were read:

"That in the judgment of this synod the study of English literature cannot be prosecuted successfully if the Bible, as the basis and inspiration of such, be left out.

"That the Bible, to have its rightful place and influence in the intellectual and moral education of our youth, should be read as literature in all the schools of the province."

Speaking on the resolution, Rev. F. H. Larkin, B.A., of Seaford, said that he endorsed the opinion of some of our best educationalists, that the Bible should be more than merely read in the schools; it should be studied as grammar or any other subject on the school curriculum.

THE TEMPERANCE MOVEMENT.

There was read the report of the special committee selected to draft a declaration on the attitude of the synod towards the great temperance issue. Rev. Mr. Hardy, who as chairman of the committee, read the report, said that the endeavor had been made to take into consideration not only the practical and numerical points of view but also that of the principle. The abolition of a traffic so evil in its character and its results; we therefore urge upon the members of our congregations to abstain from the traffic in strong drink. And in this connection we commend to all to whom our recommendation comes, the importance of making moral issues supreme in matters political and civic.

Rev. Dr. Johnston stated that in the stand he took in opposing the matter, he was moved by the dictates of conscience. So far as he could see there was no resolution to favor any political party. He thought that they had a resolution that the parties could not use as a football, looking toward the ultimate of the synod meeting. The motion was seconded by Rev. Dr. Hamilton.

Rev. Dr. McMullen, of Woodstock, said he could not see anything in the motion before the house today that was not embodied in Dr. Johnston's motion last night, which was voted down. Dr. Johnston explained the purpose of the present resolution, and concluded by saying the resolution last night might be interpreted as favoring the cause of some particular party in the political campaign, whereas he maintained that the present resolution could not be so interpreted.

The Rev. Mr. Martin moved in amendment the following: "Resolved that the synod reaffirms the doctrine that the liquor traffic is the source of untold misery and evil to the individual, the home, the church and the state. We affirm our conviction that while the work of the education of the public conscience and moral suasion, the abolition of a traffic so evil in its character and its results; we therefore urge upon the members of our congregations to abstain from the traffic in strong drink. And in this connection we commend to all to whom our recommendation comes, the importance of making moral issues supreme in matters political and civic."

there was but very little difference between the two political parties in this province, judging the one from what it had actually performed, and the other from what it had promised. At other than the whole question of temperance reform was being made a tool between the two parties and would be worked to its utmost until the 29th of May.

Some of us at least, have, he said, sought to hold the church to its place as a teacher of principles and have disclaimed its right or duty to interfere in party politics. Mr. McMechan supported Mr. Martin's amendment.

Mr. Larkin said he could not see that the temperance question was in any sense a party question, as he believed both parties wanted to get as far away from it as possible. The referendum, he claimed, took it out of party politics.

Rev. Dr. Battisby, of Chatham, stated that he wanted to emphasize the statement made by Mr. Clark that the matter of temperance reform was being dragged into politics. "It is a political question," said he, "and I deplore the fact that party politics are getting into our synod courts."

Dr. Johnston believed with Mr. Clark, that it was the duty of the church to preach principles and not to support methods. He had, he said, no method to propose. He simply asked the church to preach principles—the grand general principles of righteousness based on the word of God. It was not the place of the church to dictate to either the Reform or the Conservative party along what lines they should move.

Rev. Dr. Lyle, of Hamilton, still maintained that the resolution before the court might be interpreted as favoring the third party candidates now in the field in preference to either of the other two political parties.

The amendment was lost.

SYNOD REPORTS.

The synod then took up the augmentation committee's report. The report urged that efforts be made to bring the claims of the augmentation fund before the various presbyteries comprising the synod. It also commended the action of St. Andrew's, the First Presbyterian Church and Knox Church here in assisting the weaker congregations of London.
