

SNAP-SHOTS AT VARIOUS SPORTS

Jack O'Brien's talk of another trip to England, coming just at this time, is strangely reminiscent of the former days when he and Tommy Ryan were talking match, and were ducking each other just as often as it seemed likely that a deal might be closed. O'Brien is offered a bout with Jack Palmer, beating whom will gain him no reputation, though it may get him some British gold and keep him out of trouble on this side of the water. If O'Brien is going after men who are not directly in line for championships, or holders of the same, he would better turn his attention to Hugo Kelly. The latter beat O'Brien at Indianapolis less than a year ago. O'Brien has always claimed that the police forced him to hold himself in hand, but reputable newspapermen who were on the inside of things at Indianapolis make O'Brien's claims look very bad. Kelly is willing to fight O'Brien, winner take all. The Philadelphia hardly needs to go to England.

Some novelties of interest to sportsmen were noticed in the recent parliamentary elections in the old country. In the Boworth division of Leicestershire, Mr. Alan Stoneham, the Unionist candidate, rode his fine horse, the winner of the Melbourne cup, Clean Sweep, while canvassing. Mr. Stoneham is an enthusiast in the matter of races. In the Mid-Northampton division Mr. Robert Peel, who is a boxer of proved ability, standing six feet in his stockings, and weighing a good 250 pounds of bone and muscle, while canvassing in the Unionist interest, was set upon by a gang of toughs. "How's that for protection?" he shouted as he waded into the crowd, knocking one of his assailants out with a right swing and catching another a staggerer under the chin with a straight left. He was left alone for the remainder of the campaign.

In this age of queer ventures, when no bid for the dollar seems absurd, even the plan of a man to supercede race horses by training ostriches to take their places on the track may strike some as a wise one. This idea is actually being carried out at the Philadelphia race track, known as Barney Owen's course, the headquarters of the East Suffolk Park Driving Club. About a dozen ostriches have been in training at this track for several months past, and several are in thorough condition, broken to harness, and ready to race as soon as the time is deemed ripe for springing the new sport on the public.

The performance of Wire in at Los Angeles, Cal., on Wednesday, is worthy of more than passing consideration, since it was a case of a horse bred by an Oakville farmer going to California, where the climate is supposed to be particularly favorable for horse-breeding, and running the fastest mile and a furlong ever seen on the Ascut track. The son of Wickham and Lady Lightfoot was in front going the first quarter, ran half a mile in 49-4, a mile in 1:30-3-4, and the nine furlongs in 1:52, a track record. The possibilities to the Ontario farmer who also breeds horses are exemplified in the fact that of the progeny of Lady Lightfoot, a mare he bought for \$25, Mr. Giddings, the breeder of Wire in, War Whoop and Wicklight, has sold colts to the value of over \$11,000, and has a couple of youngsters now coming in at an age to be trained.—Globe.

Uniformity in football rules is not a problem in Canada alone, but also in the United States. The Australians, however, are not optimistic of a successful solution of it. The Melbourne Australian looks at the subject from this viewpoint: Turning to the international aspect, it is a pity that football has been allowed to drift into so many styles. Cricket is played under many and varying conditions over the world, but always with the same rules. If throughout English-speaking countries it were possible to give and take in a liberal spirit, and so establish a universal form of football, the reputation of the game would be greatly enhanced, and the way cleared for international contests in the future, rivaling in repute and popularity the classic Olympic games. We are not sanguine that this will ever be achieved. Footballers, like other athletes, are devoted to their own form of sport, and arrogant in their hostility to every rival game. Each form of football is to its followers an athletic faith, every attempt at variation an act as unwholesome as tinkering with the fundamentals of religion. The more we consider the thing, the more alluring it looks, but taking sporting human nature as it is, we realize all the hopelessness of it.

Paul Champ, of Paris, in Les Sports Modernes of Paris, tells all about the great American game of baseball, but somebody must have been kidding him about the ball, for he speaks of it as being made of wood and leather. About the only wood that enters in the national game is found in the heads of some of the players. Any manager can attest this.

Trouble with the printing of various rule books seems to be spreading, and now the Ontario Rugby Union has got itself into hot water with the Spaulding people. The committee gave the rule book privileges to the Spaulding Company for a consideration, that is to say, for so many copies of the great life work of Mr. Frank Woodworth and others. Now the Spaulding Company has sent in a bill to the O. R. F. U., charging them up with the price of all the cuts or half tones, amounting to some \$25. Which goes to show that after all it pays to follow the flag and support home industry, whether it is in football, hockey or any other athletic sport, and not go looking for rake-offs from Yankee firms across the border.—Telegram.

COVERPOINT.

GANS ON THE STRAIGHT ROAD; IS DONE WITH CROOKED WORK

Conqueror of Mike Sullivan Says He Will Now Follow the Narrow Path.

It is the firm intention of Joseph Gans, Baltimore Oriole, to be a "square guy" from this time on. At least, that is what the champion fighter declared boldly during a brief stay in Chicago, says the Chicago Chronicle. He is on his way eastward, with Baltimore his first stop. There he intends to placate his former wife, who is after him madly for more alimony. After he has an interview with the ex-Mrs. Gans, he will return to the Pacific coast, as he says he has been promised a fight there next month.

Gans never looked better in his entire career than he did yesterday, and told his friends that he never really was better nor had more peace of mind.

"I am on the right road at last," he said. "There is no one to tell me what to do, and I know enough now to do what is right. Al Herford is not my manager any more, although we still are friendly. I never could have got a match in San Francisco unless I showed them out there that I had really broken away from Al. I realize now what a detriment he has been to me all my life.

REGRETS THE PAST.

"What has been done in the past I am heartily sorry for, and will try to

make amends. A thoroughly 'busted' fighter and a wily manager are a bad combination. I have found that out. Now I have a little money and intend to be strictly on the level. I know I can beat any man in the world anywhere near my weight.

"As to the championships, I claim to be the welter-weight, best by virtue of having beaten Mike Sullivan, who surely held the title through his defeat of Jimmy Gardner. Jimmy had beaten Ryan for the title. That makes me stick out, I think. As for Joe Walcott, it was conceded by every newspaper in San Francisco that I had the better of that fight, although the referee declared it a draw. Walcott has not had a fight for about fifteen months and I doubt if he ever puts on another glove. He is out of the game for all time.

DISPUTES NELSON'S CLAIM.

"As for the lightweights, I do not see how Battling Nelson can claim the title until he has beaten some lightweight who might be entitled to class with me. He beat Britt, but so did I. No matter what the verdict was in our fight, I was pronounced the winner. As for that fight, I want to say right now I had to win it, for it was on the cards that I was to lose. I simply had to win, no matter how I did it.

"I am ready to fight Nelson or Britt or anyone else that will prove a good drawing card, but I will not do a lighter-weight than 123 pounds at 6 o'clock. I can do 123 pounds, did it for the Britt engagement, but I feel that the public

will look upon such conditions as impossible for me. Nobody believes I can make 123 pounds and be strong, yet I did not weigh over 136 when I faced Sullivan.

"But I want to say now that I am not crazy about holding titles. The show business is nothing for me, and I am willing that Nelson or anyone else who likes the footlights can carry the titles, and welcome. I want to get on some more fights for good purposes, and get enough to retire with a comfortable pile. I am only 30 years old now and do not think I will be able to fight much longer.

BRITT WILL FIGHT HIM.

"Nolan, Nelson's manager, need not have fits about fighting me. There are other matches I can get out on the coast. Britt has said he would fight me and the newspapers are demanding it out there. All Britt wants is to be assured of what he considers the right-sized house. Willie Britt told me that before I left the coast. So I am not worrying much about Nelson. But as I said before, 133 pounds at 6 o'clock for any of them."

Gans' wife recently sued for a divorce and the question of alimony came up. Gans said he was not able to earn enough to pay her \$100 a month. So the judge cut it down to \$5. Gans now fears that his former wife will make him trouble when she hears he is still able to take down the long ends of fat purses.

Gans says the Sullivan fight drew \$9,000, but that Sullivan received more for losing than he did for winning. "I fought only for 45 per cent," Gans said yesterday. "Sullivan probably fought for 65 per cent. You see, I was willing to take the match on any old terms, just so long as I had the opportunity of securing myself with the public. I never had an idea that Sullivan could beat me."

The winner breezed home an easy winner over Red Leaf, the 8 to 1 shot, while Proper, the favorite, was third. Proper opened favorite at 5 to 2, but at the bugle time 2 to 1 was the prevailing odds. The well-known eastern performer and a grand looker, Eugene Burch, could be had at 3 to 1. While Dr. Leggo, last year's Derby winner, had many admirers at 4 to 1, the start was good after six minutes' delay. Proper and Lubin acted unruly and when the barrier was sprung, Red Leaf was first to show, with Sir Brillar, San Nicholas and Proper all in motion. As they passed the stand for the first time the positions were about the same and were maintained until the three-quarters pole when Sir Brillar began to falter and fell back beaten.

RODE ON BARE RIM; REDUCED RECORD

Remarkable Performance of Earp in a 100-Mile Auto Event at Ormonde Beach.

Ormonde-Daytona, Fla., Jan. 27.—With the tire of his rear wheel gone before the fortieth mile, running on the bare rim at top speed and cheered by thousands on the beach side, Clifford Earp, in a 90 h. p. English car, broke the world's record for 100 miles today, making the distance in 1:05:30-2-5. The former world's record, made by Fletcher on the same course, was 1:13:14. Cedric, driving an Italian car, also broke the world's record. Time 1:16:33. Hilliard's car was of the same make as Clifford Earp's. At 70 miles Cedric had gained 32 seconds on Clifford Earp and 11 minutes on Hilliard. Then Cedric lost a tire and the positions were reversed. On the last lap Cedric made a tremendous effort to win, but finished a minute behind.
