## OUTLOOK IS GOOD SAY LONDON REPORTS

Both the Wholesale and Retail  
Stocks Are Moving Well  
Says Bradstreet's.

## COLLECTIONS ARE GOOD

Country Trade Is Reported Steady—  
Trade Conditions Throughout the  
Dominion of Canada.

Bradstreet's trade review says: Montreal reports to Bradstreet's say the week has seen no change in the trade situation there. Retail trade continues to move very satisfactorily and wholesalers report a steady volume of orders coming in. Drygoods houses are busy sending out spring lines. They report deliveries of textiles prompt, and all lines of goods are now going forward more freely. Staple groceries continue to move well. Values are generally steady to firm. Sugars are firm in tone. Hardware trade is active for this time of the year. Local factories are busy and labor continues to be busily engaged. Boot and shoe manufacturers are now sending out spring lines, and they report the outlook for business to be decidedly favorable. The country trade continues active. Deliveries of produce are heavier in some lines and prices show corresponding easiness. Butter continues scarce and firm. Collections are about as last reported.

Toronto reports to Bradstreet's say all lines of trade continue active. The wholesalers are still busy on spring lines. Shipments are so far been good and everything points to a heavy season's business. Factories here are all busy. The automobile show is reported to have resulted in a large amount of business. Wholesale dealers are making preparations for the spring openings, and imports of goods are reported to be large. Manufacturers of clothing and kindred lines have been busy throughout the season. Business in hardware shows increased activity. The country trade is steady. Collections are reported fair to good.

In the West, Winnipeg reports to Bradstreet's say the week has seen no change in the trade situation there. Retail trade continues to move very satisfactorily and wholesalers report a steady volume of orders coming in. Drygoods houses are busy sending out spring lines. They report deliveries of textiles prompt, and all lines of goods are now going forward more freely. Staple groceries continue to move well. Values are generally steady to firm. Sugars are firm in tone. Hardware trade is active for this time of the year. Local factories are busy and labor continues to be busily engaged. ## WEST STRONG FOR RECIPROCITY

Mr. Melville Martin's Rousing  
Address Before the Liberals  
of London.

## HOW MR. BORDEN WON

"Race Against Race and Creed Against Creed," Said the Member for  
Regina, in Hyman Hall.

That the ne temere decree had more to do than reciprocity with the defeat of the Liberal party in Ontario in September last, was the statement of Mr. Melville Martin, M. P. for Regina, at the meeting in Hyman Hall last night. He spoke of the insidious way this cry was used by the enemies of Laurier throughout the province. Reciprocity was not a dead issue by any means, and was a question that would still have to be faced.

There was a large attendance at the meeting, which was a most enthusiastic one. Mr. C. R. Sanagan, president of the Liberal Club, occupied the chair. The president, after a few remarks, stated that he had come from Ottawa to tell the Liberals of London what the Borden Government was doing at Ottawa.

A Huron Old Boy. "I am glad to come to London," said Mr. Martin in his opening remarks, "although it is not the easiest thing in the world to deliver an address among your own friends. I was raised in Huron County, and I used to come into London very frequently. I then thought that London was not only the biggest city in Canada, but in the world. Some never. In dealing with political issues, Mr. Martin declared that no Liberal need be ashamed of the sixteen years' record of the Liberal Government of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. It was a progressive administration, and its benefits were to be seen everywhere.

Americans in the West. "In some places in Canada the support given to reciprocity by the west was little change in business trade conditions there. Spring business at wholesale is opening out well and the retailers are looking forward to an excellent season. Country trade is also good. Local factories are busy and all kinds of labor is well employed. Quebec reports to Bradstreet's say little change is noticed in trade circles over the preceding week. The season has been fairly good for retailers, and wholesalers appear satisfied with the manner orders are coming to hand. Groceries are active and prices firm. Local industries are busy and the outlook is regarded with favor.

## FOUR DEATHS IN FAMILY WITHIN A FEW WEEKS

Bogue Family Suffer Severely  
—One Member Killed  
By a Tree.

The unexpected demise of Mr. Thos. Bogue, of Adelaide Township, near Strathroy, Friday night, makes the fourth death in the Bogue family within the last five weeks.

The Bagues, who have resided in Westminster Township for a great many years, are well known throughout the country. Five weeks ago, John, Thomas' eldest brother, died at an advanced age at his Westminster home. Two weeks later their nephew, Chester, died at his home near Lambeth, and was instantly killed. Chester was a man of 30 years, and left a wife and family.

On Tuesday, Feb. 27, Mrs. Thomas Bogue, of Adelaide, succumbed to an attack of pneumonia. Her aged husband was then unable to attend the funeral, as he was suffering from the same ailment. His death resulted on Friday evening.

Mr. Bogue was a former resident of Westminster, having been born on Brick street, near London. He moved to Adelaide Township, when a young man and settled on the farm on which he died. His wife was formerly Miss Margaret Thompson. The surviving relatives are: Two sons, James, of Strathroy, and Edgar, now on the old homestead; two sisters, Mrs. Tunks, of London, and Mrs. Smart, of Brockville, and two brothers, David, of Lambeth, and Richard, of Moose Jaw, Sask.

The funeral, which is to be conducted under the auspices of the Masonic fraternity, will be held Monday afternoon from his late residence, and interment will be made at Strathroy Cemetery.

## ALLEGED ILLEGAL PRACTICE OF MEDICINE

Christian Scientists Greedily Interested In Trial of Willis  
Vernon Cole.

[Canada Press.] New York, March 1.—Willis Vernon Cole, who has been under indictment for the illegal practice of medicine, was today placed on trial before Judge Seabury and a jury. Since Mr. Cole's arrest in January, one year ago, the Christian Scientists in all parts of the country have looked forward to the trial with great interest.

Mr. Cole is charged with violating the laws governing the practice of medicine in this state. The violation is a misdemeanor, and triable in a court of special sessions, but there was a general sentiment among the Christian Scientists that this was to be a test case, on which much depended, and with Samuel Untermyer as counsel the case was taken to be tried to the supreme court.

In his opening address, Prosecutor Nott said that no person is permitted to practice medicine without the proper license, and declared that the constitution of the United States permitted freedom of religious worship. He said that if the Christian Science healing art was within the law the people ought to know it, and if not that fact should also be known. Mr. Nott then told the jury that Mrs. Bessie, a private detective, would testify that she went to Mr. Cole for treatment, and that she was directed to sit beside Mr. Cole, while the latter prayed with his hands covering his eyes for fifteen minutes, and charged her \$2 for the treatment.

must have more outlets. The Hudson Bay Railway will provide another spout, but the present Government has stopped the construction of this line, setting the work back at least a year. We will have other outlets to the south, which is our natural trading ground."

## Government of Commissions.

The present Government is a government of commissions. They were elected by the people to administer the affairs of the country, but instead of assuming the responsibility they engage costly commissions to handle the business of the country. They shirk the responsibility of administering the affairs of state. One example of this is the attitude of the ministry on the Farmers' Bank question. Prior to the election, Hon. T. W. Crothers promised that the shareholders and depositors would be reimbursed if the Conservatives were returned to power. They now refuse to stand by these promises, because they know that the position of the Liberal party on this question was sound. Hon. W. S. Fielding had granted the charter in the ordinary way, and he knew that a few men behind it were crooks, it would not have been granted them. The Government at the present time have named a commission to investigate some document that could be gone through in half an hour. This is a shameful waste of money.

The Grand Trunk Pacific. Another commission had been named to investigate the Grand Trunk Pacific. The worst thing that they could find out was that the road cost too much. What good would that information be, he asked. The road was constructed by the Liberals at an average cost of \$56,000 a mile, while railways in other countries cost from \$18,000 to \$22,000 a mile. It was a good road, the best of its kind, and would mean much for the Dominion in the future.

The Borden Government had already left a record of broken promises. They promised the west that the natural resources of the provinces would be given to them. In the case of Manitoba, this has not been done, nor will it be done. Mr. Borden promised to hurry the construction of the Hudson Bay line, but had held up the contracts, delaying the work at least a year. He promised to take over the terminal elevators by the Government, and this he had not done.

Reciprocity Sounded. "Reciprocity today is as sound economically for the east as for the west," declared Mr. Martin. "We are very strong for it in the west, and it will be just as good for the east when it is done. Reciprocity alone did not defeat the Liberal Government. The ne temere decree had much to do with it. There are Conservatives holding seats, many of them, who are there because of this method of campaigning. They whispered among the electors everywhere that Sir Wilfrid Laurier was responsible for the ne temere decree. In Ontario this species of campaigning was unblushingly used, and many Liberals were overthrown, not because reciprocity was either good or bad, but because of this religious agitation. The Conservatives promised a uniform marriage law. What have they done to redeem that promise? They have refused to touch the question, but have shifted the responsibility to the courts. They have done this on every big question, and we are not surprised at their attitude to this important matter."

The double policies of the Conservatives in Ontario and Quebec were referred to as the unholy alliance between the Nationalists and the Conservatives condemned.

The Conservative Campaign. "The Conservatives were returned by a race-and-creed campaign," said Mr. Martin. "In both provinces, Quebec and Ontario, double-dealing prevailed. Sir Wilfrid Laurier's policy was consistent, and he never tried to array race against race, or creed against creed, in this or any other province. He has given his life to cement the races of Canada together, and that policy will yet triumph. At the next election, both in the Dominion and Provincial, he will win a great victory, and a hearty vote of thanks was tendered the speaker on motion of Mr. U. A. Buchner and T. H. Purdon, K. C.

## \$100,000 FIRE LOSS.

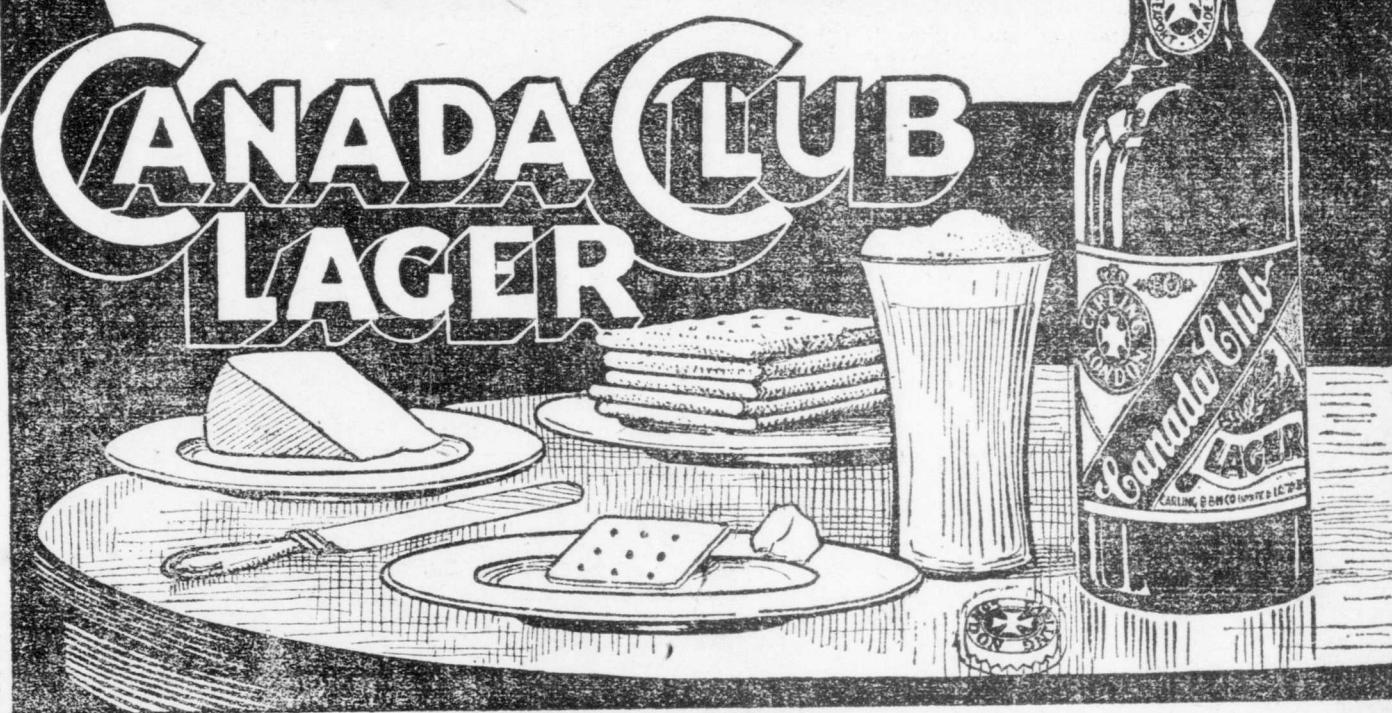
