London, Sept. 22.—Canadian Press Cable.—Sir John Simon, on returning to England after his visit to Canada, expressed himself to the Canadian Press representative as full of enthusiasm for the Dominion of Canada and her people. His stay across the Atlantic has been delightful.

Sir John begged to be excused, however, when asked as to his views concerning the Canadian attitude regarding legal appeals to the privy council in London. He said he did not feel disposed to deal with this subject.

It will be remembered that on his return from Canada last year, Lord Cave of the court of appeal gave an extensive account of his impressions of the matter of dominion appeals to the privy council, and much lively discussion was thereby provoked.

DELAY IN FILLING

GOVERNMENT POSTS

Applications Sent to Ottawa
Over Two Weeks
Ago.

Many folks are coupling hints from Ottawa as to the return of patronage and the re-organization of the Meiklen cabinet, as explaining the delay in filling some of the vacant Government jobs now open in this district.

About the time that the local postmaster became vacant, or rather the change was made, the postmaster-ship at Windsor was also opened by the resignation of Mr. Wigle. It still remains open, the deputy, Joseph Casgrain, acting in the meantime. This situation, in marked contrast to the London situation, when the deputy, Thomas Dunlop, was appointed postmaster before the local postmaster, Peter McDonald, was retired.

Two Weeks Ago.

On September 8, applications for the local post of deputy postmaster were to be in at Ottawa, and though nearly two weeks have passed, Ottawa has not peeped in regard to the name of the successful applicant. There are those who now fear that the post will be used to best advantage politically instead of rewarding some of the old hands who have applied for it and who are entitled to it as a reward for long and faithful service.

Another local post remaining unfilled, although the applications for it have been in some time, is that of local supervisor of city dispatch, which became vacant by the superannuation of Mr. McNeil. William Skinner, the other supervisor, is an applicant for the deputy's post, and if he were successful in landing it, another supervisor-ship would immediately become vacant.

Seemingly the question is as to whether or not the civil service is still making appointments. The conclusion from the present delay is that the civil service is not, and this may wreck the chances of any of the local staff who have made a stab for the post.

FLASHES STOLEN.—Valuable "flashes" of the theatre were taken from in front of the Majestic Theatre on Tuesday night. This is the first theft of this theatre's property that has occurred this year, directors of it say, but a number of thefts were committed last season. They intend to appeal to the police department for added protection.

NEW MINISTRY
TO ASSIST IN
APPOINTMENTS

Dissolution Not Expected in
Time To Avert West York
By-Election.

DOHERTY'S JOB UNKNOWN

Former Minister of Justice
May Be Sent to U. S.
Capital.

(Special to The Advertiser.)
Ottawa, Sept. 22.—Comparative quiet reigns at the capital today following the announcement of the new Meiklen cabinet. A council was called for noon and most of the new cabinet members were present. Dr. R. H. Manion, the new cabinet minister of soldiers' civil re-establishment, arrived from Fort William this morning and was duly sworn in. R. B. Bennett, the newly-nominated minister of justice, is not expected to come for a week, as he is engaged in a law case at Calgary. In the meantime, Hon. Hugh Guthrie will be acting minister of justice.

Dissolution will not come in time to avert the nominations for the West York by-election. The issuance of the writ will, however, cancel polling day. Dissolution may be expected at any moment, but whether the writ will be issued concurrently remains to be seen. It is considered probable that the premier will clean up the whole business before he leaves for the west at the end of the week.

Among the matters to be cleaned up and not the least difficult of them is the filling of existing vacancies in the senate and elsewhere. The reconstructed cabinet will have some say in the selection or in the approval of those selected, so that former predictions may be regarded as unfounded.

The decision to replace Hon. C. J. Doherty with R. B. Bennett was, arrived at on the eve of the new cabinet reconstruction, and was the decision to bring in Mr. Manion. The premier states that Mr. Doherty will receive some other appointments. Concerning what it shall be, there is much speculation. It is not considered likely that he would accept the high commissioner-ship, but there are rumors that he may go to Washington to take a position provided for two sessions ago, but so far never filled. There is a further rumor to the effect that Hon. William Shaughnessy has become solicitor-general and run for election in St. Anne's.

MUST ANSWER FIVE

CHARGES OF FRAUD

William Graham, of no particular address, pleaded not guilty to five different charges of fraud preferred against him when he appeared before Deputy Magistrate P. H. Bartlett in the Carling street court this morning. As crown witnesses had to be summoned on four points, his trial was postponed for a week. Crown Attorney J. B. McKillop, K.C., intimated that charges of forgery may also be laid against the prisoner.

When charged with obtaining \$18 from A. E. Wilkinson knowingly, fraudulently and with intent to defraud, on September 17, Graham pleaded guilty, but later changed his plea, saying that he did not do it "knowingly."

He elected summary trial. The same plea and election was made in four other cases, namely, obtaining a coat and hat from Solomon Orth on Tuesday, attempting to secure \$150 from the Molsons Bank on Wednesday, securing \$50 from the Molsons Bank on Tuesday, and obtaining a McLaughlin-Bulcar car from the "Universal Motor Sales Company on Wednesday.

Extreme coolness was displayed by Graham when he answered the charges. So cool "was he in and out the crown remarked that his nerve was to be admired.

The prisoner's defence was intimated to be that he was expecting money from England, and on the strength of this expectation issued checks.

Detectives Harry Down and Thomas Bolton arrested Graham on Wednesday afternoon, and recovered the auto and other goods.

City Briefs

EX-BISHOP TO SPEAK HERE.—It is announced that Dr. Kinsman, former Episcopal bishop of the Diocese of Delaware, New York State, will speak in London next month. Bishop Kinsman will address the Catholic Club in St. Peter's Hall on October 6. His subject will be "Catholicism and the World."

REVIVE CHILDREN'S HOUR.—The children's department in the public library is again in full swing. Although it was open during the summer holidays, the attendance was small, the book clubs cancelled operations, and the story hour was shelved until the children returned to school. The attendance has picked up wonderfully in the past two weeks, and in a short time the story hour will again be one of the features of the department. Children of all ages attend the story-telling hour, when a qualified member of the library staff relates stories, about fairies, animals or anything which will prove interesting to the children.

Japanese Consul Will
Pay Visit to London

S. SHIMIZU, Japanese consul-general at Ottawa, will visit London within the next ten days to study business conditions here, and to familiarize himself with the various local industries. He will also tour Southwestern Ontario. The Japanese recently, through various communications received lately by the local chamber of commerce, have shown a desire to create closer business relationships with Canadian business firms.

MORE CHANGES
IN H. S. COURSE

New System Subject to Modification If Unfavorably Received.

Booklets explaining the changes recently made in the high school curriculum of Ontario have been sent out by the department of education at Toronto, supplementing the first booklet sent out some weeks ago.

The latest instructions are as follows: "Beginning with 1922 there will be no examination in reading and writing, and no special paper in spelling. Papers will be set in the subjects of Canadian history and civics, geography, art, botany, physiology, arithmetic, grammar, and zoology. For those candidates who elect to take agriculture and horticulture in lieu of botany and zoology, there will be a first and a second year paper in agriculture and horticulture. In addition there will be a paper in Latin grammar for those who wish to substitute Latin grammar for English grammar. In all subjects the standard for passing will be 50 percent on each paper.

"Under no condition should an attempt be made to subdivide the subject of physiology into physical geography and physics, taught by different members of the staff. To do so would be to defeat one of the main objects of the course.

In concluding his explanation the booklet says: "It will be surprising if minor amendments are not needed to bring the new course to perfection. But it is believed that in its main outlines it will be found to accomplish what is expected of it, namely, to regulate the curriculum which has long been the subject of complaint, and at the same time to enable the pupil to obtain a more thorough mastery of the subjects of study."

SLIGHT PROSPECTS
OF A CONFERENCE

Lloyd George and Advisers
Are Adopting a Strong

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MEN EXCLUDED FROM
ARBuckle HEARING

Number of Witnesses Are
Summoned to Give Evi-
dence Today.

San Francisco, Cal., Sept. 22.—The preliminary hearing of Roscoe Fatty) Arbuckle on a charge of murder, in connection with the death of Miss Virginia Rappe, before Police Judge Sylvain Lazarus occupied the attention of all connected with the case today. Men were excluded from the hearing under an order issued last night, the authorities ruling that the hearing was a woman's courtroom, no men, except witnesses, court officials and newspaper reporters should be admitted.

The prosecution will endeavor to prove at the hearing, District Attorney Matthew Brady has announced, the contention that Arbuckle attacked Miss Rappe in his suite of rooms in the Hotel St. Francis in testimony given by Miss Rappe which resulted in her death four days later. The complaint charging murder, and under which Arbuckle has been held in jail without bail, was sworn to by Mrs. B. M. Belmont, friend of Miss Rappe and one of those who attended the film comedian's party.

Brady said he believed the preliminary hearing would occupy at least three days.

The witnesses subpoenaed for today's hearing are as follows: Dr. Shelby Strange, acting autopsy surgeon, who performed the autopsy on the body of Miss Rappe.

Dr. William Ophuls, who performed an autopsy in company with Dr. Vin. R. R. the local coroner, who will be closed down from Friday of this week until October 3. The Straiford shops will be closed during the same period also.
