

SAYS SUBURBAN ROADS SCHEME UNFAIR TO CITY

Members of Council Think London's Share of Upkeep Too Heavy.

AUTHORIZE MEETINGS

Will Give Municipal Candidates Four Chances To Discuss Public Issues.

The city council on Wednesday night authorized Mayor Little to call four public meetings, at which candidates for municipal office may discuss various questions of the day and place their platforms before the electorate. The meetings will be held as follows: Friday, Nov. 25, East End Hall; Monday, Nov. 28, Wortley Road School; Wednesday, Nov. 30, Talbot Street School; Friday, Dec. 2, Masonic Temple.

The principal discussion at the short meeting of the council was on the suburban road question. It came up in the report of No. 2 committee in which the committee adopted a resolution passed by the Sarnia council, condemning the suburban road scheme as being "wholly unfair" and protesting against making cities and towns contribute towards the upkeep of these roads. Statements made by Mayor Little would seem to indicate that the city's burden in this regard may be materially reduced.

Mayor Little left the chair so as to enter into the discussion on the clause. He stated that the matter had been up earlier in the year, and the city had to pay \$7,500 as a result of a suit with the county, as well as face a bill rendered since for \$22,000. A special committee had been appointed to consult with City Solicitor Meredith, and learned that even if the city did win out in the courts it would be little trouble for the Legislature to amend the act making it retroactive, so that the city would have to pay anyway. He therefore thought that the council would be ill-advised in passing such a clause, especially as there was no hope of having the legislation changed. He pointed out that the road to Lambeth was giving increased business to the city and was good for the city, "especially as we cannot get out of it," he added.

Must Pay 30 Per Cent.
London must shoulder 30 per cent of the cost of nine roads running out of the city for a distance of seven miles beyond the city limits, the mayor explained. He had hopes, however, that this mileage would be materially reduced, perhaps to 40 miles in all, and if this was the case it would mean that the city would get more permanent roads, and thus cut down the cost of maintenance.

Ald. W. A. Wilson declared it unfair to tax the city for a portion of the cost of these roads. He thought that the people in the county used the roads more than the city and could see no harm in the resolution.

Ald. Wenige wanted to know how long this road agreement must continue. Mayor Little said that the county could take a sum equal to one-half a

mill on the tax rate of the city for road work and the council would have to put up a similar sum. This would make up 40 per cent of the cost and the other 40 per cent would be put up by the province. Replying to Ald. Wilson, he said it was just as unfair to make the city pay for a small as a large mileage, but it would be equally unfair to fix one road to the city and not another.

Says Roads Needed.
Ald. Drake said that if the city was to reach 100,000 population there must be good roads leading to it. They would bring people to the city.

Ald. Ashton did not think there was any chance to get away from the suburban road measure, even though most people considered it unfair.

Ald. Harley asked if there was a definite move on to cut down the mileage.

The mayor replied in the affirmative, and was satisfied that there would be a reduction.

Ald. Bridge was for an amicable settlement. He pointed out that the city could not co-operate with the county by throwing stones at it. The clause of the report was filed.

Ald. Wenige opposed the recommendation to increase the pay of snow plowmen \$1 a trip. The cost of everything was on the decline, he said. Ald. Harley, Drake and Ashton supported the motion and it was adopted.

Ald. Wenige thought it was folly to go ahead with the sewer for the fair grounds until it was known definitely whether the fair grounds was going to be moved. Mayor Little explained that the sewer being laid would be for an extension of King street if the fair grounds were moved.

The council was informed that it will at least two weeks before a report will be ready on the gasoline tanks. Ald. Wenige said that many businessmen with tanks on their hands were getting impatient waiting for permission to install them. Mayor Little pointed out that the solicitor had ruled that the tanks should all be ordered out.

Walk Through Mud.
Ald. Brighton called attention to an unrepaired break in the sidewalk on Tecumseh avenue. He said pedestrians have to walk through the mud.

Ald. Harley asked the mayor if the police commission had met to consider the juvenile court question as yet. He was informed that no move had been made.

Ald. Watkinson said that a resident of Eva and York streets was being made to pay for walks on both streets. He was told to appeal to the clerk.

Ald. Ashton asked if the bus carrying passengers on Dundas street had a license. He was told it should have.

A resolution of sympathy in connection with the death of Edmund Meredith, K. C., was passed by a standing vote on motion of Ald. Harley and Ald. Wenige.

Ald. W. A. Wilson succeeded in getting his motion endorsing the policy of tenders for all public work passed by the council, although it was defeated at the last meeting of No. 2 committee. He also presented a resolution, urging legislation be passed granting the wives of all property owners or tenants in the city the right to vote at municipal elections. At present only those assessed as co-owners or co-tenants get the vote.

City Clerk Baker was instructed to advertise the names of all candidates running for municipal office for four days, some time before polling day. The mayor will issue a proclamation, asking all employers of labor to let their hands off one hour extra at noon that they may cast their vote on municipal election day.

LONDON WOMAN IMPLICATED BY CORONER'S JURY

Mrs. Louise Leslie Still Held on Murder Charge in Toronto.

YOUTH ADMITS PAYMENT

Says He Gave Dead Girl \$65 for Services of "Party" From London.

TORONTO, Nov. 23.—"We find that Eileen Lyons came to her death at the Toronto General Hospital on Nov. 13, 1921, as the result of blood poisoning caused by an illegal operation."

"The jury is strongly of the opinion that the evidence points to Mrs. Louise Leslie as having performed the illegal operation, and that Norman Urquhart and John Collins are accessories to the crime."

After hearing the final evidence in the case of Eileen Lyons, 17 years of age, who died after an illegal operation said to have been performed on Oct. 20, a coroner's jury sitting under Chief Coroner George W. Graham at the morgue last night, implicated Mrs. Louise Leslie, the London woman said to have come to this city to perform the operation at the request of John Collins, a worker in a Queen street east candy parlor.

Admits Responsibility.
Urquhart, the other of the three implicated, is the young man who took the responsibility for Miss Lyons being in the condition which necessitated the operation.

Mrs. Leslie is held on a charge of murder, and John Collins with having conspired with her.

From evidence which came out, it would appear that Mrs. Leslie had a number of Toronto "patients" for Alexander McDonald, manager of the Biersford Hotel, on Queen street east, where the prisoner stopped on her last trip, told of several young women coming to see her in addition to the Lyons girl.

Girl Sought Help.
Urquhart said that a friend of his had introduced him to Collins. The friend lived in Riverdale, but his name was not given. At that time Miss Lyons had told Urquhart that she needed help.

He had visited Collins upon eight occasions and was finally told that the party from London would come down on Saturday, October 29.

He and Miss Lyons met Collins, and the other party, a woman, came along a few minutes after. Urquhart did not identify the woman, although no reason for his not being able to do so was brought out.

He had given Miss Lyons \$65, which was the price agreed upon. The meeting took place at the corner of Queen and Church streets at six p.m., and a further meeting was arranged for 8 o'clock, which also took place.

After this Miss Lyons and the woman went east from Queen and Sherbourne, where the second meeting occurred.
