HOCKEN REPLETES TO FALLON PLEA FOR EQUALITY

Claims Prelate's Demand Would Force Protestants To Pay For Catholic Teaching.

ASKS EXPLICIT PROPOSAL

Believes Public School System Should Get Benefit of Any Doubt.

TORONTO, Jan. 23.—"Why should Protestants pay for teaching Romanism?" demanded H. C. Hocken, M.P., Orange grand master, in replying today to the long open letter of Bishop Fallon to the boards of education of Toronto and London in regard to the school question.

Mr. Hocken contended that to force Protestants to help pay the teaching of the Catholic religion would be one of the results if the claims of the bishops were conceded, life said:

"It is impossible in a brief statement adequately to reply to the six column article from Bishop Fallon that appeared in the Monday evening edition of 'The London Advertiser.' It is evident that much time was given by the bishop to the preparation of the case. More than two columns of it were given in answering the resolution of the board of education of Toronto. The members of that board are able to take care of themselves, so I will refer only to his claim for amendments to the assessment act that will give the separate schools larger revenues."

Asks Bishop To Explain.

"In this he is not explicit in his statement. He says: 'The amendments to the assessment act that we desire—let them take what form they will—will simply such amendments as will give effect to the main provision of the separate school act.' 'We had a more definite demand from Bishop Fallon in an address that he delivered at Peterboro a couple of months ago, when he said the taxes of incorporated companies should be divided between the public and separate schools on the basis of either of attendance or population. Archbishop McNeil made a statement before the Canadian Club that could be interpreted only in the same way. I take it, therefore, that that is what the bishops want."

"As the law stands at present the separate schools can secure all the school taxes that can be shown to be derived from shares in incorporated companies held by Roman Catholics. There will be found in the office of the city clerk of Toronto a list of companies that desire their taxes to be so divided. And these companies are assessed for separate school purposes in the proportions set out in their notices to the city clerk—some of them 100 per cent, some 75 per cent and some 50 per cent. It is clear, therefore, that the act is not 'inoperative or ineffective.' If the separate schools are not getting all the taxes to which they are entitled from such companies, the fault lies with the Roman Catholic shareholders."

Cites Mowat Precedent.

"As to public utility corporations like street railways it may fairly be argued that as it cannot be shown what is the exact interest that Roman Catholics and public school supporters have in them, the whole tax should go to the public non-sectarian school system that was designed, and is maintained, to educate the children of all creeds upon an absolute equality. At least that seems to have been the opinion of the late Sir Oliver Mowat, who was not unfriendly to the separate schools. He passed a special act in 1891 to give all the taxes of the Toronto Street Railway to the public schools, when the majority of the stock was held by Roman Catholics. That was a condition made by the city council when granting the thirty-year franchise in 1891, and it had the approval of Sir Oliver Mowat and the Legislature of Ontario."

"In the case of such companies as the C. P. R., whose shares are on the market, and changing ownership almost every day, it is, of course, impracticable to say at any date what proportion of the stock is held by people of the different religious faiths. My contention is that in cases where such a complication arises the public non-sectarian school system should get the benefit of the doubt, especially as these are also public utilities."

"But to amend the assessment act as the bishops have suggested and divide the school taxes of all incorporated companies on the basis of population, would be a rank injustice, both to the public schools and to the separate schools."

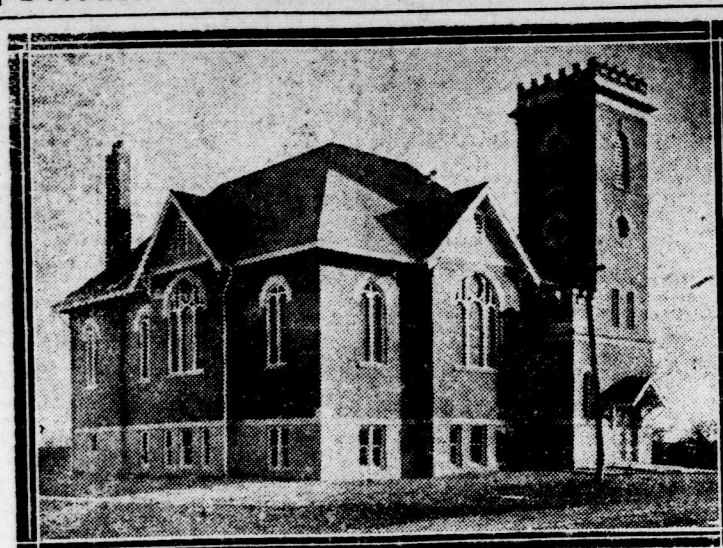

and to the Protestant ratepayers. If the law were amended in that way Protestants would be compelled to pay hundreds of thousands of dollars to support separate schools and consequently to pay for the teaching of the Roman Catholic religion. Nobody has suggested that Roman Catholics should pay for the teaching of Protestantism. Why should Protestants pay for teaching Romanism?

A Special Privilege.
"Protestant fathers are not permitted to pay their taxes to the separate schools, although their Roman Catholic wives insist on sending their children to the separate school. The reason for that is that separate schools were granted to Roman Catholics as a special privilege, and one that is denied to all other denominations. The father is the taxpayer, and being a Protestant, is required by law to support the public school. He can send his children to the public school."

FURTHER PARLEY ON FRENCH PACT

PARIS, Jan. 2.—Premier Poincaré has sent instructions to Ambassador St. Aulaire, in London, for continuation of the conversations with Great Britain concerning the proposed Anglo-French pact.

The premier's instructions are known to be directed toward a lengthening of the duration of the pact, probably a period of 25 years, and to the inclusion of reciprocity in military action, so that France would be obliged to go to the aid of Great Britain, thus establishing the basis of equality in the pact which the premier has indicated he desired.

Discussion of the Geneva economic conference has not as yet been taken up by the French foreign office.

STATES SHERIFF HAS FULL POWER

TORONTO, Ont., Jan. 23.—Hon. W. E. Roney had no comment to offer today on the dismissal of Deputy Sheriff Watterworth by the new sheriff of Middlesex, Donald A. Graham. The personnel of Mr. Graham's staff was a matter entirely within control of the sheriff and was not within the province of the department in any way, Mr. Roney declared.

As to the statement said to have been made in an interview by Watterworth that he was passed over after 28 years of service in order that patronage might be given Graham, a farmer, and a T. F. O. supporter, it is pointed out that Graham was recommended for the appointment by all members of the legislature for Middlesex, and the department only passed over the deputy sheriff after full consideration of the demands of the office.

One factor which was given consideration was the practical certainty that before long, following upon the investigations of the public service commission, the office of sheriff will be combined with that of high constable in all the counties.

This would considerably add to the duties of the office, now rather light, and call for a young and vigorous man in charge.

TWO PLEADED GUILTY TO THEFT OF AUTOMOBILE

WINDSOR, Jan. 23.—William Bell, 23 years old, Detroit, and Roy Vanatter, 25, Windsor, Monday pleaded guilty to stealing an automobile from the garage of J. Paget, 34 Campbell avenue, Windsor, and breaking into the drygoods store of Queen & Armstrong at Colton, 20 miles east of Windsor. Both were remanded until Saturday for sentence.

Bell and Vanatter were arrested by Constable Frank Brown of Essex after a chase of 12 miles over plowed fields.

FINDS FIREMEN CAME TO DEATH ACCIDENTALLY

Jury Returns Verdict At Quiz Into Montreal Fire Tragedy.

ONE CHINAMAN MISSING

Latest Estimates Place Total Damage At About \$400,000.

MONTREAL, Jan. 23.—Verdicts of accidental death were returned at today's inquest into the deaths of Lieut. Napoleon Des L. Goes and Fireman Louis Paul Presseau, who were killed in Sunday night's disastrous fire in Notre Dame De Grace.

Further details regarding the outbreak have now been obtained, one of which is the fact that two firemen, manning the nozzle of a hose in a temperature of five degrees below zero, became so solidly frozen together that a hammer had to be employed before they could be separated.

Many of the tenants had narrow escapes. One, Adam Smith, had to jump over an area of flame three feet wide, with his aged mother in his arms, before he could reach the stairway.

More conservative estimates now place the damage in the immediate vicinity of \$400,000.

TORONTO, Jan. 23.—Hon. Manning Doherty today announced the appointment of W. R. Reek, B.S., as director of the Western Ontario Experimental Farm at Ridgeway. The appointment is to take effect March 1.

The farm, which was purchased by the minister of agriculture two months ago, will be used for experimental work in improving seed corn, sugar beets, tobacco and other special crops of the southwestern section of the province. It will also aim to assist the producers in the solution of general problems, such as marketing, by the development of strong co-operative organizations.

Mr. Reek has been selected for the position, according to the minister, by reason of his training, experience and personality. He was born on a farm in Kent County, and is therefore acquainted with all the local conditions and local problems.
