National Railways.

MONTREAL WILL not admit that Toronto is the place for the headquarters of the National Railway system, while Toronto seems to be thoroughly convinced that were the headquarters moved to Montreal that would be the beginning of the end of the whole busi-

The Montreal Gazette claims that the proposal of Torontonians "to bribe the federal government into making their city the headquarters of the National Railway system by gift of a free site is very parochial. It is true that the chief office of the Canadian Northern is in Toronto; but when the facts are known, if they ever should be disclosed, it will e found that the selection of this site was due to personal and not to yusiness reasons. Of all the claimants for headquarters Toronto's precensions are the least impressive. It is not even a way-station on any one of the great transcontinental lines, to say nothing of a terminus or a gateway for the inflow and outflow of traffic. Toronto is a large, pro gressive and assertive city, surrounded by a fine agricultural country, dotted with thriving towns, and animated by an intense provincialsem that resents the mention of any other city in the same breath. Toronto is admirable in many ways, but s is not the natural site for National Railway headquarters. There are scores of places that will give scores of free sites, and throw a free ding into the bargain, to become seadquarters of 22,000 miles of rail-

NOR IS THE Montreal Gazette prepared to admit that the government of Canada is committed, on the basis on the action of the late Conservative administration, to a policy of public ownership of railways claiming that the roads were taken over because the necessities of the case left no other course open.

"The fault into which ministers are prone to fall," continues the Gazette, "is in confounding a temporary situation with a permanent principle. If public ownership is a good thing in the case of railways it should be equally a good thing in every class of public business; and as we cannot have too much of a good thing, why limit public ownership to half the lines in Canada? Why not place every mile of the roads under government operation as in Australia, in Germany, and in the United States during the war? To do so is the logical conclusion of the argument of those who favor public ownership. Yet there is not a sericus businessman, nor a studious politician, nor an informed economist unaware that wherever public ownership prevails it has produced costly

and inefficient results. "The late government was conboard of directors with arbitrary powers. That was not public operation, nor the plan the public want. It may be said that private railways are managed by boards of directors appointed by the shareholders, and why may not public railways be similarly managed by a board nominated by a government responsible to Parliament, whose members, in turn, are responsible to the electors?
