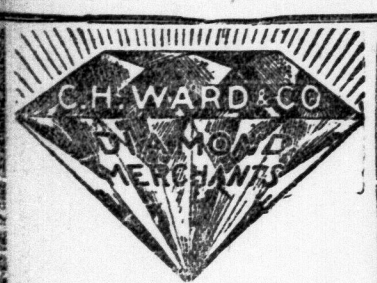

HUNTED LIFER KILLS

PURSUING OFFICER

Escaped Inmates of Marquette
Prison Fight Posse In
Dense Swamp.

Escondido, Mich., June 21.—Frank
Curran, special deputy sheriff, im-
pressed into service in the search for
George Bloch and George Natchoff.

Two escaped "lifers" from Mar-
quette prison, were shot and killed
by Natchoff yesterday while the
posse was surrounding the escaped
convicts in a dense swamp near
Maple Ridge.

Bloch was shot through the leg
and captured by another deputy.

Natchoff is armed with a 45-calibre
automatic pistol, has plenty of am-
munition and will "shoot it out to a
finish," according to Bloch.

Natchoff, who is practically sur-
rounded in the woods, is believed to
be a "hardcore" convict.

One prison deputy was slightly
wounded in the interchange of shots
which has been going on since day-
break.

The capture of Natchoff is expected
before morning.

Ontario Athletic Union Desires
To Have Competitors at
Olympic Games.

Toronto, June 20.—The Ontario branch
of the Amateur Athletic Union of Cana-
da issues the following bulletin:
"In view of the fact that the Olympic
games are to be held in Paris next
year, it is the desire of the officials of
this branch that every opportunity be
given to all who have the ambition,
ability known or otherwise, to develop
the same during the present track and
field season.

"There is undoubtedly undiscovered
ability in many boys in this province,
who, if given the chance, may be our
future hopes.

"The Ontario championships will be
held in London on Aug. 4, and previous
to such date all sections of this province
should hold elimination meets and send
the winner of the same to London for
these games.

"A number of the Ontario champions
will compete at the Canadian cham-
pionship meet which will be held in Halifax
in September. This meet will no doubt
give the Olympic committee an oppor-
tunity to size up the calibre of those
entered, as the meet will serve as a pre-
liminary Olympic try-out."
