

# GOVERNMENT TO REMAIN, PREMIER WILL SUMMON JANUARY PARLIAMENT

Mackenzie King Bases Decision  
On Strength of Low Tariff  
Representatives.

RIDING TO BE OPENED

Majority To Be Determined  
by Elected Members, Not  
by Largest Party Groups.

Ottawa, Nov. 4.—Confirmation of expectations that Premier King would continue in office and meet parliament, leaving it to the people's representatives to say what party should rule, came tonight in an official statement from the prime minister, after he had had further consultation with the government's representatives in the House of Commons. Parliament is to be summoned at the earliest possible date so that it may have opportunity of determining the question arising out of the peculiar numerical position of the parties.

It is expected, in view of the premier's statement, that parliament will be called to meet not later than January. In the meantime, the government will make no appointments not essential to the carrying on of public business.

In recommending the summoning of parliament, the cabinet took the view that under the principle of responsible self-government in Canada the majority were entitled to govern, but the majority as determined by the elected representatives of the people. Mr. Meighen, the prime minister points out, could not command such a majority. He further makes it clear that there is no precedent in Canada or Great Britain for recommending in advance of the meeting of parliament that the leader of a party not having a majority in the House of Commons should be asked to form a government. The course dictated by precedent and circumstances is that of allowing the house of commons to disclose its attitude on division.

## SEPARATE JEWISH SCHOOLS FAVORED

Appeal to the Supreme Court  
Brings Question to  
Fore Again.

Although opinion among Hebrews is more or less divided on the question of whether or not a separate primary school should be inaugurated by the Jews of the province of Quebec, there appears locally to be considerable sentiment in favor of such a move.

The matter has been brought into the limelight through an appeal being made to the supreme court of Canada, from a judgment recently handed down by the Quebec court of appeals, which ruled that the legislation enacted by the Quebec legislature to the effect that, for school purposes, Jews should be regarded as Protestants, was ultra vires of the Quebec legislature.

The controversy arose over the unwillingness of the Protestant school board of Montreal to allow members of the Jewish religion to act as members of the board. It is pointed out by London Hebrews that almost the total enrollment of many Protestant schools in Montreal is made up of Jewish children, and because of this they feel that members of their faith should be admitted to the school board.

In Montreal there is a strong feeling among many Hebrews that the school board should build up a third school system, distinct from the other two in Quebec.

Max Lerner of this city favors such a scheme. He points to the fact that the constitution provided for such a plan if it is desired, and explains that the Jewish school board in Montreal is made up of Jewish children, and because of this they feel that members of their faith should be admitted to the school board.

"This is hardly fair," he says, "and not at all in keeping with the freedom of religion which is guaranteed in the constitution. Our people should receive money out of the regular tax with which to maintain schools of their own just as do the Protestants and Catholics."

No Agreement  
"In the interval until parliament assembles, it is the intention of the government to refrain from making appointments beyond such as are essential for the proper carrying on of the public business."

"In the present situation there are three possible courses of procedure, which have been carefully considered by the cabinet:

(1) That his excellency be asked to grant an immediate dissolution of parliament;

(2) That his excellency be asked to call upon the leader of the largest political group to form a government;

(3) That his excellency be asked to summon parliament at the earliest practicable date for the purpose of re-opening the election.

"With respect to an immediate dissolution, it was felt that it was not in the interests of the country to open the door to the possibility of another general election until at least the people's representatives in parliament had had an opportunity of expressing their views."

"With respect to the leader of the largest political party having the largest definite following in the house of commons being called upon to form a government, the cabinet decided unanimously that it was the duty of the constitutional duty to meet parliament at the earliest possible moment, regard being had for the legal necessity of the return of the writs and the official gazetting of the members who have been elected."

## OFFICIALS PLEDGE OF OIL CAR RUN

Transcontinental Test May  
Ultimately Mean Passing  
of Locomotive.

BRANCH LINE PLAN

Forrester Believes Oil Electric  
May Be Used on the  
Huron and Bruce.

Real pride in the new record for a transcontinental run, made by the C. N. R. oil-electric car, was expressed this morning by C. N. R. railroad officials. The car made a trip from Montreal to Vancouver in 67 hours, and during that period the engine of the car was never stopped. It was the longest non-stop run ever made by any engine, 2,937 miles, and creates a new record. The trip, besides demonstrating the value of the car, showed the efficiency of a railroad system which could accomplish the feat.

"It was a pretty good performance," was the comment of Charles Forrester, superintendent of the C. N. R. "I have no doubt that type of car will come into general use on branch lines, such as the Huron and Bruce. It will be where the car will be used."

From the first to the last the transcontinental trip demonstrated the superiority of the new oil-electric car. Arranged primarily as an endurance test for the engine, not only did it prove this point, but also it showed the speed possibilities which previously had not been proved. At one point on the western route 23 miles were made in less than three hours, the steepest grades in the Rocky Mountains were climbed at an average speed of 40 miles per hour.

Officials of the Canadian National Railways who accompanied the car in its transit, to the Huron and Bruce, themselves as being thoroughly satisfied with its performance, and, in their opinion, it is within the realm of possibility that this journey may be the forerunner of a new epoch in motive power as applied to steam railroads. The oil-electric car is in its infancy, they point out, just as the steam locomotive was in its infancy a century ago. With wider application and further development, they believe it may develop along similar broad channels, and this may bring about the passing of the steam locomotive.

Three Questions  
Mr. Justice Lacombe gave the jury three questions to answer:

1.—Was the defendant guilty of negligence? If so, why?

3.—The amount of damages in the event of the defendant being found guilty of negligence.

The jury answered No to the first question. They answered Yes to the second question, and that the defendant was guilty of negligence. They answered Yes to the third question, and that the damages should be \$5,000.

The jury took just 30 minutes to answer the three questions. They were asked to answer them at 10 o'clock, and they were back in court at 10:30.

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## Guy Fawkes To Be Burned In Effigy On Market Square 320 Years After Big Plot

Parade From Ulster Hall Will Find Members of All Orange  
Lodges in City in Line—Bands To Take Part.

An effigy of Guy Fawkes will be burned tonight on the market square in commemoration of the Gunpowder Plot which occurred in England in 1605. On Nov. 5 of that year, Guy Fawkes, together with Robert Catesby and other Roman Catholic adherents, had completed the plans by which they hoped to destroy King James I., his two sons, his ministers, and the entire house of commons while in session at the parliament buildings. The plot of the conspirators was to pack with gunpowder a cellar immediately beneath the house of lords, and to light the fuse at the zero hour when the members were in attendance.

Roman Catholic members of parliament were warned not to attend parliament on the fatal day. These warnings were analyzed, and the plot was detected. Fawkes was captured in the act of lighting the fuse, and he was executed by hanging, drawing and quartering.

The lives of the members were saved, and the Gunpowder Plot of the 17th of November has been recognized as a day of national thanksgiving.

The arrangements for the big celebration tonight are in charge of J. W. Carson, A. Niven, W. B. Savage and Joe Murray. A huge parade will be formed at Ulster hall, Dundas and Clarence streets, at 7:45 p.m., and every Orange lodge in the city is expected to participate.

The London Orange brass band, the Forest City flute band, and the Hackett five and drum band will take attendance, and together with the hundreds of flaming torches will form a picturesque array as they parade to the historical square.

Upon their arrival here the effigy of Guy Fawkes will once more fall prey to the flames. Following this grand ceremony a banquet will be held at Ulster hall. E. T. Essery, past grand master of the Grand Orange Lodge of Ontario West, will preside at the banquet.

The Rev. Mr. J. W. Hibbert, past grand chaplain of the Orange lodge, will be the chief speaker of the evening. A grand chorus of songs will be presented. Miss Isabelle Mortimer and Miss Mae Metcalfe will offer several recitations. The Misses Connelley will render several pleasing vocal solos.

An oyster supper will also be held at the Orange lodge. The Rev. Mr. W. H. Lowe will be the speaker of the evening.

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## LATTA'S RISE IN POLITICS NO SURPRISE TO LONDONERS

Man Who Is Likely To Be Premier of Saskatchewan Lived in  
City Many Years.

Inclusion of Hon. Charles Dunning, premier of Saskatchewan, in Mackenzie King's government at Ottawa would probably mean the selection of Hon. Samuel J. Latta, minister of education, and well-known as a former resident of London, as his successor in political affairs of the western province.

All who knew Mr. Latta when he resided in London for the period 1895 to 1906 as a public school teacher, speak of him in the highest terms, both as to his ability and his personality, intimating that they are in the least surprised either at the position which he has already attained or at the honors that are likely to come to him in the future.

While a resident of this city Mr. Latta taught school under the late R. M. Graham at Simcoe street school, and later was principal of the old Colborne street school.

Famed as an Artist.  
"Mr. Latta was a really wonderful good fellow," declared Wm. Wallis, principal of the old Colborne street school, "and everybody liked him as principal. He was quite an artist and an amateur photographer, and at the public school art exhibit, which was held in the old city hall in 1905 he was one of the most active workers. He was always one of the most popular."

Born in Huron County.  
Mr. Latta, who was born near Zurich in Tuckersmith township, Huron county, is a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. John Latta. Two brothers, Charles Latta, a school teacher, and Edward Latta, a public school teacher, were residents of London for a time, but they, too, moved to Western Canada some years ago. He is married and has one son and one daughter.

Edward Barrell, 310 Oxford street, is a nephew, while there are eight or nine nieces who also live in the city.

REV. JOHN HOSIE,  
Pastor of St. George's Presbyterian Church Here Is  
Undecided.

Rev. John Hosie, St. George's Presbyterian church, who has been called to Kintyre church, is as yet undecided whether he will accept the call or not. Mr. Hosie, who has been pastor of St. George's church for fifteen years, has been prominent throughout the church union campaign. He will likely have reached a decision in the matter when the call comes up at the next meeting of the London Presbyterian presbytery for consideration by that court.

Mr. Hosie's call is only one of five or more calls to come before the London presbytery at its next meeting. Rev. Chas. Waddell, B.A., St. Mary's, has been called to Delaware and Tempo charge, while A. Ledes, student at Knox college, Toronto, has been called to Port Stanley as successor to Rev. Peter Jamieson, B.A., who has moved to Long Branch, N. S. Waddell and Kintyre congregations have given a call to Rev. Chas. M. Anderson, B.D., LaSalle, Mo., but according to Rev. James Kay, R.D., moderator of presbytery, work has been received from Mr. Anderson that he will be unable to accept the invitation owing to unsatisfactory state of his wife's health. The congregations will therefore have to proceed to call another man.

Knox church, St. Thomas, will meet on Tuesday night next week to extend a call, while it is quite probable that Mosa church also will have decided to call a minister prior to the date of presbytery meeting.

Gloria's Husband  
Furnishes Proof  
Shows Title Bestowed by Polish Queen in 1707.

New York, Nov. 5.—Numbering among its passengers Gloria Swanson and her husband, the Marquis de la Palaise de la Courde, and Ignace Paderewski and the Prince and Princess Ass of the Japanese royal house, the French liner Paris reached New York last night, 24 hours later after one of the roughest voyages it had ever made.

Gloria Swanson was highly contemptuous of reports tending to discredit the title of her husband. The marquis produced documents to show that his title was not a mere fiction, bestowed upon his ancestor by Queen Maria Casimir of Poland in 1707.

Miss Swanson said it made little difference to her whether her husband had a title or not. "I married a man and not a title," the motion picture actress said.

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## VENDOR IS CENSURED FOR NEGLECTING HORSE

Ice Cream Man Is Brought to  
Court on Charge Laid by  
Humane Inspector.

For allowing his aged horse to reach a "terrible state of starvation" by feeding it only weeds, Raffaele Rizzo, 47 years old, an ice cream vendor, came in for denunciation in today's police court, and on being convicted on a charge of cruelty to animals, he was fined \$10 and costs.

Humane Inspector George Tustin declared that he found the horse yesterday in Rizzo's yard. It had been lying neglected for more than a day, he said. It was just a frame of bones covered with a hide. Rizzo, in attempting to make the animal rise to its feet, had beaten its head with a stick of wood.

In view of the fact that the animal was in such a weakened condition that it had to be destroyed, Magistrate Graydon inquired what he termed only a small fine, declaring that had the horse lived Rizzo would have been given a severe sentence.
