Another Royal Marriage.

London, April 13.—J. E. Mograth and J. H. Turner, of the United States coast and geodetic survey, have arrived here. In an interview, McGrath said: "The United States steamer Hassler is going North in connection with the hydrographic survey of Yakitat bay. A party, consisting of myself, J. H. Turner, two recorders and eight men are going up in the vessel to determine the geographical position and height of Mount St. Elias. T. Morse goes up with us to Sitka on the same vessel. To take observations for time and latitude, we will establish an astronomical station at Yakitat bay. To obtain correct longitude we will have stations at Tacoma, Sitka and Yakitat. The vessels are ready for sea and only waiting us. We have some preparations which we hope to complete in a day or two. Our work is in connection with the survey of the Canadian and United States boundary between British Columbia and Alaska. Mr. Turner and myself were engaged upon that work for two years, from July. 1889, to September.
