TOWN AND COUNTY WILL PAY BILLS

Hospital Accounts Long Outstanding Will be Paid Adjusted Now.

AMOUNT INVOLVED.

Hon. J. K. Fleming was here last week and took up the matter of the payment of fees for pauper lunatics in the Provincial Hospital from the Town of Campbellton and the County of Miramichi. The matter was fully gone into and in the case of the town the amount agreed upon was about \$1300.00, which amount the town will be obliged to pay, as well as \$65 per year for the lunatics at present in the Hospital from this town. In respect to the county, the bill is a little larger, being the vicinity of two thousand dollars. Mr. Fleming in behalf of the government which he represents, was disposed to deal fairly with the people concerned and he will recommend settlement of the account as agreed upon. While other countries and towns have been here and not been paid for as it was claimed some at least were not from the town or county.
