A Frenchman's Views.

The subject is attracting much attention here. Henry Kleinau, who represents a great French publishing house in London, has written a strong letter to The Times, giving warning that the concession once made in favor of Canada could not be withheld from Australia and other colonies, and that France, Germany and other parties to the Berne agreement would have just cause for complaint, if partial and one-sided exceptions were introduced. He asks in what position troduced. He asks in what position British authors would be if such important bookmaking centres of Germany as the kingdoms of Saxony, Bavaria and Wurtemburg determined to free themselves from the convention accepted at Berne for the whole of Germany. He predicts that piracy will soon again be the order of the day, if Canada he evented from the opera-Canada be excepted from the operation of that convention.

Britain Holds the Fast Train Record. Reitain Holds the Fast Train Record.

New York, Sept. 15.—The London Times, claims that the English West Coast line still holds the record for Siced. A corespondent says: "Taking the time, stoppages included, the record of the West Coast train, covering 540 miles in 512 minutes; it was only 510 minutes to the ticket platform, where the journey practically ended.
